THE RACES

The races at the State Fair grounds yesterday afternoon were attended by the largest crowd so far this week. The big amphitheater seating 6000 people, was crowded to overflowing with many of the spectators standing in the paddock in front, and on the east side of the track for two blocks up and down the fence.

Race number one was the Oregon Purse of \$400 in the two-year-old trot class, and five out of the 13 entries started at the wire. The race was carried away by Geo. Gill's horse Zomdel in two straight heats out of three, the time made in the first heat being 2:42 1/4; second heat, 2:41 1/2. Zomdel got first money, Florador Z., second money and an equal division was for Dr. Jones and Jemima King, who both won third and fourth heats.

The Inland Empire Purse of \$500 in the three-year-old class was represented with four horses out of the nine entries. Dr. Ulman, Bonkin, Katalina and Princess Direct. This race was also won in two straight heats, the bay filly, Katalina, belonging to J. W. Zibbell & Son, getting first money, Dr. Ulman second, Princess Direct third and Bonkin fourth money. The time made in these two heats was 2:20 1/4 and 2:21 1/4.

Nine out of 11 of the speediest pacers in the 2:08 class ever drawing a sulky on Lone Oak track were let loose by Judge Col. Harriman in the 2:08 pacing race for the Greater Salem Purse of \$500. Charley D., driven by his owner, won the money in three straight heats out of five, and although the track record was expected to be busted to smithereens in this event, no better than 2:08 could be registered against the fastest horse of the race. The first heat was run in 2:08, second heat in 2:08 1/4, and the third go in 2:09 flat. In the first heat Miss Idaho was given the pole on the judges draw, but Charley D. passed her before the first quarter was finished and held the lead under the wire by a half length, and Tidal Wave clung to the winner for second place with Magladi in third position after a strong race with Miss Idaho in the stretch. Charley D. was the pole horse in the second heat and he held the lead throughout the mile. Tidal Wave got second place in the start but at the first of the last half broke falling back to fourth place with Magladi and John R. Conway finishing second and third. The third and last heat was started with Charley D., and Delliah who fought for the first place during the full first half when Charley D. pulled ahead and kept the position under the goal by a length. Tidal Wave and Delliah raced the stretch for second place and for a few moments it appeared as though the Delliah would stop under the wire a winner for that position, but the Wave sniped to the good within 20 feet of the winning point. It was an established fact to the ones on the inside, that the swift Charley D. would gambol off with the 2:08 stake, and had the betting ring been in vogue, someone would have left the fairgrounds broke. Considerable comment was made by the fans on this race, as they expected results far more faster than those made by Charley D. and his running mates. Driver Thompson of the winning thoroughbred was well aware of the fact that he would be forced to send his animal the limit against the field behind him, and for this reason the time on the program remained untouched.

The State Fair Handicap running one mile race was won by Melar; Redwood second, Arcourt third and Imint fourth. The time made in this event was 1:41 1/4. The exhibition which attracted more attention notwithstanding the other speedy races, was the little guidelines; pacer, College Maid. The wonderful mare did not come up to her mark of Monday, but she went the mile in 2:10 1/4 and the first half in 1:02 1/4. Had she retained her pace from the first half through the remainder of the mile she would have stood a good chance of beating her Monday's record. The large crowd thoroughly appreciated the
