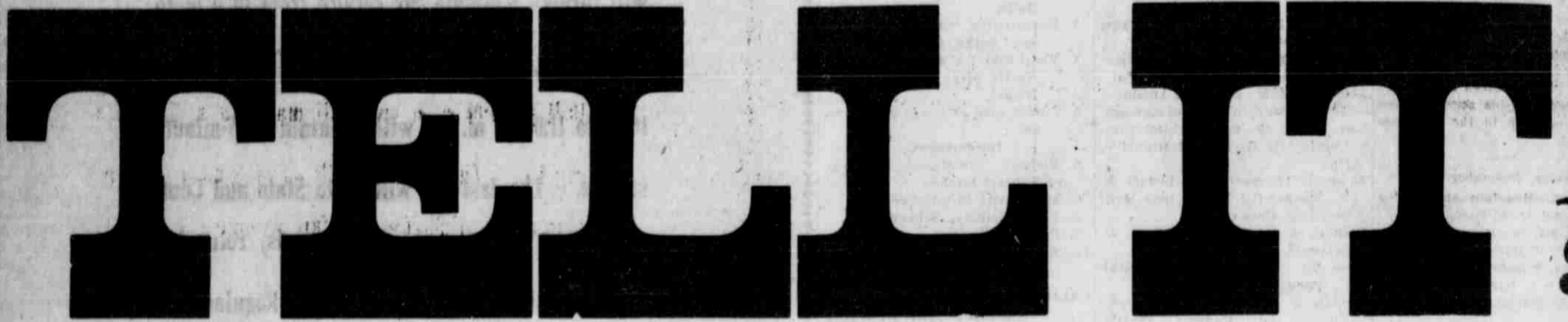

PRACTICAL REFORM IN SAN QUENTIN

(United Press Lensed Wire.)

Sacramento, Cal., Aug. 17.—It was announced at the offices of State Engineer Ellery today that the first actual work to be done on the new prison building at San Quentin that provides for the segregation of prisoners into three classes and thus makes possible the reformation of first offenders, will commence as soon as the material is available which will be in a short time. Ground for the new building has already been broken at San Quentin.

The new building will be the latest thing in prison construction and will be sanitary and healthy. It is to be so arranged that each prisoner will have a separate cell. The whole building is to be of reinforced concrete and the yards about the building will be arranged so that the prisoners of each class will not come together.

When prisoners are received, they will be placed in the second class. If they behave they will be put in the first class and allowed to wear plain clothes and grow their hair and beards. If they do not behave, they will be placed in the third class and forced to be shaved and wear stripes.

A new building at Folsom on the same line is planned. When the new buildings are finished, the old buildings will be torn down.
