Townsend Creamery Co., which has an extensive trade in this city, was the heaviest loser, in its Portland store, among four Portland creamery houses who were victimized by a man who called himself L. G. Myers. Myers opened a creamery which he called the Quality Butter Plant, at 1022 Belmont street, Portland. This was on August 8, and shortly after opened accounts with the largest wholesale creameries, and was buying on credit \$686.90 in supplies. He sold his stock, disappeared, and is now being sought by the police. Those defrauded were: T. S. Townsend Creamery Co., \$216; Crystal Ice Co., \$130; Hazelton Creamery, \$190; Washington Creamery, \$150.

# ATLANTIC FLEET ON WAY TO PHILIPPINES

Albany, West Australia, Sept. 18.—The Atlantic fleet left here at 5 o'clock this morning for the Philippines, one day later than scheduled time. Despite the early hour, a great crowd of people lined the shores of King George's Sound to witness the departure of the American ships from Australia.  
The big ships saluted as they left the harbor, and from thousands of throats came cheers for the Americans, who had won their way into the hearts of the Australian people.  
Admiral Sperry wired his thanks to Premier Alfred Deakin today for the kind message that he received yesterday.  
The last of the coal was stowed away late last night, and the jacks on several of the ships were up late cleaning the decks and polishing the big guns and the brass work.  
Everything was ready for departure at 4 o'clock, and it was just barely daybreak when the ships hoisted their anchors and steamed away. Every officer expressed his regrets at leaving Australia, and will remember the good times that their English cousins have made for them while they were here.  
Admiral Sperry said today that he expected to arrive at Manila on schedule time, October 21.  
Outside the cementing of friendship between Australasia and the United States, which has been the biggest result of the fleet's visit to the Antipodes, the most interesting feature of the trip has been the demonstration that the big battleships can be run long distances on less coal than it was hitherto thought possible.  
This has been rendered possible by improved engines and fire boxes that have been installed in American warships during the past few years.  
So great has been the saving in coal, that Admiral Sperry has received permission from the war department to reduce his coal estimate for the trip home through the Mediterranean sea by over 8000 tons.

### Jurist Commits Suicide.

Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 18.—Chas. G. Van Fleet, former superior court judge in Colorado, and one time candidate for congress, is dead today, having committed suicide yesterday after receiving a letter from his wife at San Jacinto, saying she was without food, and that their 6-year-old son could not go to school because he had no shoes.

Van Fleet, who studied mineralogy after leaving the bench, had vainly endeavored to secure funds with which to develop some Nevada mining property he owned. When he failed in that project he sought employment, but could not find anything to do.  
Liquor caused the downfall of the dead jurist. He came to California several years ago to break himself of the drink habit, but was unsuccessful.

### HASKELL PASSES

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Chicago, Sept. 18.—Governor Chas. N. Haskell, of Oklahoma, today gave the lie to William Randolph Hearst, who, in a speech at Columbus, Ohio, last night called Haskell "the political paymaster of the Standard Oil Company," and charged him with having acted as the agent of the Rockefeller corporation. Hearst read a petition written by former Attorney-General Montt, of Ohio, in which he said an effort had been made to bribe him by "Charles N. Haskell, late of New York City," acting as agent for the Standard Oil. Governor Haskell today said:  
"The statement is false. Hearst knows it is false. You can quote me for that. I am not the Haskell mentioned in Montt's petition."  
"I was in Columbus, 177 miles from Cleveland, when the man indicated in Hearst's speech was in Cleveland. The matter was brought up in the Oklahoma campaign, and Montt went to Oklahoma and explained the mistake, the error having been made in the initials."

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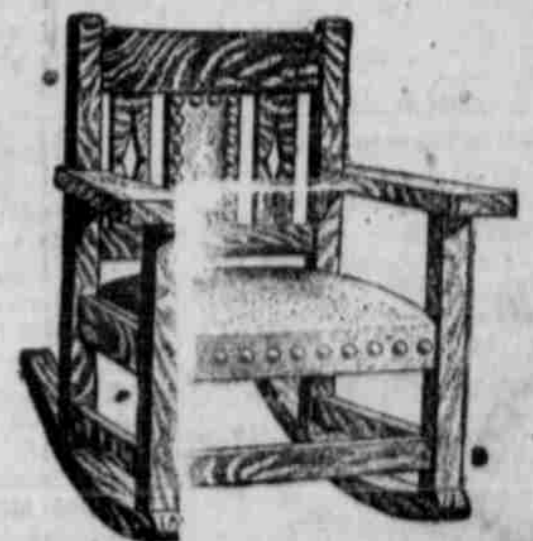
