Bids must be enclosed in sealed envelopes and directed to the Clerk of the Board, plainly marked, "Bids for supplies for State Institution for Feeble-Minded" and the class of goods bid on should also be inscribed on the envelope. Price, fitness and quality being equal, preference will be given to articles manufactured, grown or produced in this state. When a particular article is specifically called for, bids on other kind, manufacture or brand equally good will be entertained, but to insure recognition of such bids, samples of the articles it is proposed to supply must accompany them.

The board reserves the right to reject and or all bids, or to accept or reject any part of a bid. Bids will be opened at the Capitol at Salem, at 10 a. m., Tuesday, October 6, 1908.
