COUNCIL CONSIDERS NEW HIGHWAYS TO STATE FAIR GROUNDS

While nothing of very great importance was done by the council last evening, a number of urgent small matters were attended to. In the matter of a sewer in North Salem it was referred back to the sewer committee with instructions to take the same up with the state authorities in order that the sewer may be extended to the state fair grounds, where facilities were in very poor condition this fall season. The case of the Salem Flouring Mills Co. v. the Oregon Electric Railroad was then taken up, and, after a communication by Mayor Rodgers on the matter had been read, stating the milling company had a very flimsy right to hold a franchise on the North Mill creek street crossing, the special committee on this matter was instructed to look into the case, and report at the next meeting. It appears that the council had ordered the railway company to lower their grade on High street, and, in doing so, they would be compelled to lower their bridge across the North Mill creek at the same street, and the Salem Flouring Mills Co. was not in favor of this move. The railroad company lowered their road yesterday, according to specifications.

council asking permission to place signs upon the electric pole at the intersection of State and High streets with information contained thereon regarding the rules of the company as to the stopping places of their trains. After considering the matter, the council decided to give him permission, providing electric lights were placed in the sign. Another communication was read from A. M. Dalrymple, asking the city to establish a grade on Nineteenth street, east of State, as he declares he is not desirous of spending money to lay a new walk over provisions made for grades by the councilmen of the sixteenth century. The city engineer was ordered to establish the necessary grade. The city attorney was ordered to draw an ordinance stating in what stage of decay building would have to be before they could be condemned. Dr. Brewer made a complaint, through one of the councilmen, regarding the bicycle nuisance on the west side of his store. He states that wheelmen come whizzing by near the building by the stairway on the west side of his store, and that some provisions should be made to eliminate this. No action was taken in the matter. The bid for a new sewer on Bellevue street was awarded to Bernardi & Dunsford, the cost of installation being \$782.75.

POULTRY DEALER SHOWS HOW THIS CITY GROWS

Manager Pitts, of the Court street poultry and fish market, says he has practical proof of the way Salem grows. A year ago his market dressed about 150 to 160 chickens for the trade of Saturday. Last Saturday's trade demanded 350 chickens to be dressed besides nearly 50 more sold alive. He says the next census should be taken by a count of the chicken heads at his market.

MILK CONDENSING PLANT AND CANNERY

Stayton is to have a milk condensing plant and cannery. The Times says: After having made a complete examination of the fruit cannery and evaporators in Monmouth and other towns, W. A. Weddell returned Friday. He is favorably impressed with the business end of the proposition and feels confident that Stayton is the proper place in which a cannery would pay well.

He says that he was very courteously treated by the proprietors of the various plants who also gave their expression of assistance in the establishing of a cannery in this section. We believe that a cannery would be well patronized here and with it would come a greater production of fruits of all kinds. At the present time there are tons of fine fruits going to waste for the need of something in which to can them.

This is a fine fruit section and irrigation is not necessary. Nature has favored this vicinity with everything needed in agricultural pursuits.

WHAT HAPPENED TO MORGAN

Fred Morgan, of Jackson county, while stopping at a creek to let his horse drink, was bitten in the hand by a rattlesnake, which he killed. It was as thick as a man's arm, 5 1/2 feet long and had five rattles. It took five hours for Morgan to get to Ashland, but he had tightly bandaged his arm. His finger was cut to let the poisoned blood drop out, and three pints of whiskey in his stomach and one pint injected failed to make him drunk, and strychnine was administered all night. Exactly a week before, he had fallen 35 feet down a well, and escaped barely in time to miss a blast of dynamite. People up there are wondering what is going to happen to Morgan next.

Spectacle Frames
