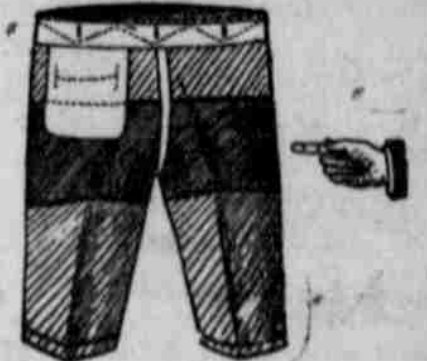

### Unmailable Postcards.

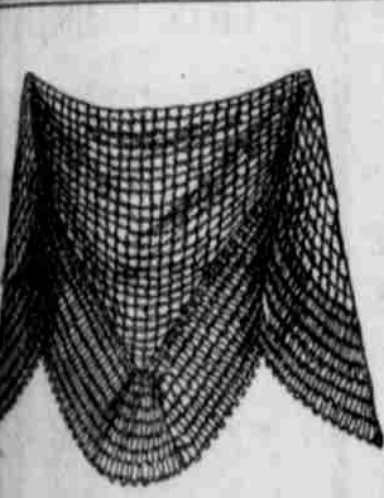
A great many unmailable postcards are deposited in the mail each day that have to be withdrawn from the mail and sent to the dead letter office: Section 418, Par. 5, postal laws and regulations, reads as follows: "Cards bearing particles of glass, metal, mica, sand, tinseel or other similar substances, are unmailable, except when inclosed in envelopes."

Postage stamps should be placed upon the envelope, one cent if there is no writing upon the card and the

envelope is left unsealed, and two cents when there is writing upon the card

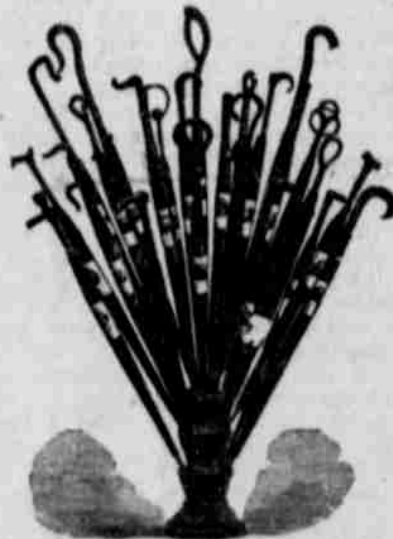

This meeting, commemorating as it does the sixtieth anniversary of the first woman's right convention ever held in the world, promises to be a most auspicious gathering. Among the prominent persons who have already accepted invitations to be present and speak are Miss Jane Adams, Mrs. Florence Kelley, Mrs. Katharine Reed Balen, Mrs. Charles Edward Russell, Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, Rev. Antoinette Brown Blackwell, President M. Cary Thomas of Bryn Mawr and Mrs. Harriot Stanton Blach.

### STATE NEWS.

Seventh-Day Adventists in Portland are incensed at the Sunday closing law.

Grant Pass has been added to the already large list of Oregon cities to organize Taft clubs.

The Portland council has come to the support of Mayor Lane and has barred women from the saloons.

The Oregon City stores will close next Friday to enable a large number to attend the Clackamas County Fair at Canby.

The University of Oregon role has come up to 420 and it is expected 500 will have registered before the end of the week.

A routing good roads meeting at Medford last night indicates that thousands will soon be realized to build the road to Crater Lake.

John Meyers, for twenty years a resident of Huntington, fell from a two-story building yesterday and will die. He is 65 years of age.

Clackamas county vegetables, consisting principally of potatoes, beans and similar plants, have been partially destroyed by the frost.

Councilman Wilnot of Albany prevented the granting of a franchise to A. Welch last evening by refusing to allow the measure to be read the third time before it had rested on the table two weeks.

The Mohawk Lumber Company at Donna, near Springfield, has been sold out. While no consideration is named in the deed, it is reported to be \$175,000. The property includes 2,000 acres of heavily timbered lands.

Mrs. Belle Waymire, convicted of attempting to blackmail Mayor Lane of Portland, will probably never serve her four months' sentence in jail, as she has left the state and cannot be returned. The bail of \$100,000 for 400 square feet of floor space at the announced later.

Next Wednesday will be a gala day for Hillsboro. The Oregon Electric will complete its line to that city; then, and invitations have been sent broadcast to attend a carnival and the driving of golden spike—the last one to connect the road with Hillsboro.

### STEAMSHIP LINES TO FIGHT RAILROADS.

San Francisco, Sept. 25.—Two steamship lines have formed an agreement to compete with the trans-continental railroads for the Pacific freight from all the points bound for Europe. According to the agreement, the Pacific coast steamers are to transport freight to Salina Cruz, at which point it is to be taken across the Isthmus of Tehuantepec,

a distance of 189 miles, by rail, at which place it will be picked up by the Atlantic ships at Puerto, Mexico. The steamship combine opened the fight today by a reduction of rates of from 15 to 30 per cent. The Pacific lines that are involved in the agreement are the American-Hawaiian line, the Kosmos line and the Canadian & Mexican Pacific line. On the Atlantic side, the participants are the Royal Mail line, the Hamburg-American line, the Campagne Generale Trans-Atlantique of Paris line, the Campania Trans-Atlantique of Barcelona, the Cuban Line of London, the Harrison Line of Liverpool, the Leyland Line of Liverpool.

The three Pacific coast lines will cover all ports from Vancouver, B. C., to Los Angeles, Cal., including ports of Hawaii.

### COLUMBIA INJUNCTION EXTENDED TO OREGON

Portland, Or., Sept. 25.—At the suggestion of Master Fish Warden McAllister, the temporary injunction granted by Judge Gilbert, in the United States court last week, prohibiting the Oregon authorities from interfering with fishing on this side of the river, is to be extended so as to cover both sides of the Columbia river. Attorney-General Crawford looks upon the plan favorably, as do the county authorities. The injunction is returnable next Monday, and at that time a request will probably be made so that the extension order will rest until the case in the supreme court is decided.
