

CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION Friday, Sept. 25, 1908

Opening. Conference opened at 8:15 a. m. with devotions led by W. T. Kerr; at 9 o'clock the bishop took the chair.

Minutes. The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Communications. The following communication, signed by B. Lee Paget, representing the Laymen's association, was read:

The secretary: Bishop Hughes and the Members of the Oregon Conference: Dear Brethren:—The Laymen's association, in brotherly sympathy with all your problems and ambitions and appreciative of all your noble sacrifices and efforts, bears grateful memory the helpful counsel and encouragement which have been given to us in joint session by our presiding bishop during previous annual conferences, and desires to express the hope that it may not be far from your program and may be in harmony with your desires to change a suitable time today, at which we might call upon you in order to express our fraternal greetings and bear such words of admonition as our good bishop have it in his heart to deliver.

Joint Session Voted. On motion of R. E. Dunlap, it was ordered that the conference meet in joint session with the Laymen's association at 1:30 p. m.

On motion of T. B. Ford, W. H. Black was delegated to inform the members of the joint meeting.

Transfers Requested. The following resolution was presented by B. F. Rowland: That we request Bishop Hughes to transfer Mr. Sandifer, a supernumerary member from the Illinois conference, and A. B. Calder, a supernumerary member from the North Minnesota conference, to this conference, and that their cases be referred to the committee on conference relations with the view of making them effective.

Order of the Day. The resolution made the order of the day for Friday morning immediately following the reading of the minutes was read by the secretary. On motion of C. T. Wilson, the conference voted to limit the time of speeches to five minutes.

A number of brethren participated in the discussion.

A substitute for the resolution was presented by T. B. Ford as follows: Whereas, We believe that a rearrangement of district boundaries in this conference should be made in the interests of economy, efficiency and permanency; therefore be it resolved, That Bishop Hughes be respectfully requested to appoint a committee, consisting of four members of the conference, one from each district, to act with the committee representing the Laymen's association of the Oregon conference, and which committee Bishop Hughes will be chairman, to report to the conference the number and boundaries of the districts which it deems necessary for the best interests of the conference.

Resolved, That we request the bishop's association to appoint a committee of four laymen, one from each district, to act with the committee of this conference.

The further discussion, on motion of W. T. Kerr, the previous question was ordered, and the conference voted the substitute to the resolution.

On motion of W. T. Kerr, W. H. Black was delegated to inform the members of the association of the action

of the conference, regarding the commission, as above. On motion of T. B. Ford, the reception of the class into full membership into the conference was made the order of the day for Saturday at 10 a. m.

Introductions. H. N. Herrick, North Indiana conference; G. A. Landen, Puget Sound conference; D. L. Rader, editor Pacific Christian Advocate; J. R. Knodell, Anti-Saloon league; Walter Skipworth, Columbia river conference; Dean Kimball, of Kimball college of theology; L. W. Chandler, Idaho conference; L. Jean, Nebraska conference and H. P. Blake, West Wisconsin conference.

Addresses. W. K. Donlon addressed the conference on behalf of the American Bible society.

E. R. Willis addressed the conference on behalf of the deaconess work.

Restoration of Parchments Requested. On motion of Benjamin Young, the restoration of the parchments of Lowther, as a local deacon, as requested by Walton Skipworth, of the Columbia river conference, was referred to the committee on conference relations.

Commission Appointed. The bishop announced the appointment of Benjamin Young, Portland district; W. H. Sellock, Salem district; J. K. Hawkins, Grants Pass district, and W. S. Gordon, Eugene district, as ministerial members of the commission on districts and boundaries.

Reports. Benjamin Young reported on behalf of the committee on deaconess work. On motion the report was adopted.

The announcements were made and the benediction pronounced by Dean Kimball.

Joint Session. The conference met in joint session with the Laymen's association at 1:30 p. m., with Bishop Hughes in the chair.

After singing "How Firm a Foundation," the bishop called B. Lee Paget, A. F. Flegel and R. A. Booth to the platform, each of whom addressed the conference.

The bishop addressed the conference in response.

After singing "I Love Thy Church, O God," announcements were made and the benediction pronounced by the bishop.

7:30 p. m.—Temperance rally. Addresses by Rev. Benj. Young, Rev. F. Zimmerman, field agent Anti-Saloon league, and B. Lee Paget, of Portland.
