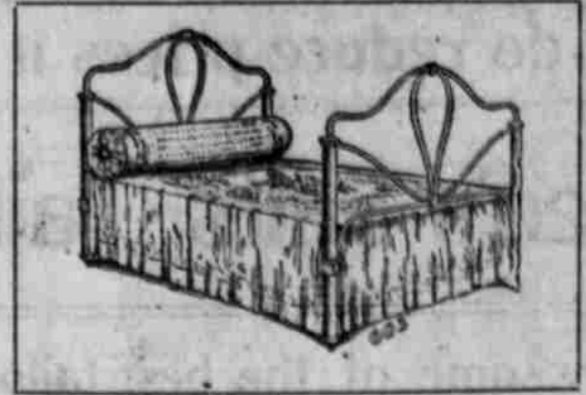

TODAY—
MORNING SESSION
 Saturday, September 26, 1908.
 Opening.
 Session opened at 8:15 a. m.
 Session led by C. M. Van
 derhook the bishop took the
 Minutes.
 Report of yesterday's session
 read and approved.
 Report of yesterday's joint session
 read and approved.
 Report of W. T. Kerr, a business
 agent of the conference was
 read at 2 o'clock.
 Report of Commission on District
 and Boundaries.
 Young presented the report
 of the commission on districts
 and boundaries, recommending that
 the report be left in the hands of
 the conference.

the endowment fund for conference claimants made his report. Report was adopted:

 The report was adopted.
 The report of the trustees of the conference claimants permanent fund was read by H. Gould, and adopted.
 The secretary read a resolution, signed by the conference trustees and J. I. Jones and A. F. Flegel, committee of the Laymen's association, recommending the forming of a corporation to be known as the Conference Claimants Permanent Fund of the Oregon Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, the object of which shall be to receive and administer all moneys received for conference claimants. On motion the resolution was adopted.
 T. L. Jones read a letter from R. A. Booth, announcing a gift of \$5000 for the conference claimants endowment fund, in memory of his father and mother, Robert and Mary Booth.

Report of Committee.
 R. C. Blackwell read the report of the committee on Canby camp grounds. On motion of W. T. Kerr, the report was adopted.

Question Five.
 "Who have been continued on trial in studies of the second year." Earl H. Bryant, I. V. Parker and H. J. Adams were called, characters passed and their cases represented by their district superintendents. On motion, they were continued in the studies of the second year.

On motion of W. T. Kerr, notice was served on E. H. Bryant that failure to bring up his studies the next conference year would result in his discontinuance.

Question Seven.
 "Who have been admitted into

full membership." was taken up. Henry L. Grafous, Geo. W. Ellis, Robert H. Allen, Wm. C. Stewart and Colonel W. Pogue were called, being favorably reported by the registrar and the committee on conference relations, and being recommended by their district superintendents, and having filed with the secretary proper answers to questions 1 and 2, paragraph 146, of the Discipline of 1904, were elected to deacon's orders and advanced to the studies of the third year.

Henry W. Kuhlman was announced transferred from the New York east conference, as a probationer in the studies of the second year. Having complied with all requisite conditions and being favorably reported, he was advanced to the studies of the third year and elected to deacon's orders.

This class was addressed by the bishop, answered the usual discipli-

nary questions, and on motion, were admitted into full membership in the conference.
