### SAYS GIRL WHO SAVED ELKINS IS ADVENTURESS

San Francisco, Sept. 28.—That Mrs. Ada Louise Lonsdale, the actress, who is suing the youngest son of United States Senator Stephen B. Elkins for \$100,000 for breach of promise, was formerly married to a San Francisco man, and has a local history, was made public today in a story that is exciting comment in social circles.

Miss Lonsdale was formerly the wife of Leonidas J. Scoffy, a real estate man of this city. The couple were married in Washington in 1895 and two years later the woman secured a divorce on the grounds of desertion.

Scoffy says she had good grounds for divorce, as he left her. He refuses to say why he left her, but intimates that she was after money rather than love in seeking a husband.

Miss Lonsdale was the daughter of a Southern family that was impoverished by the war, and was known as a beautiful girl.

## CONFESSES TO MURDERING AND BURNING LIFE

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Bellingham, Wash., Sept. 28.—Tortured by remorse, crazy with nervousness which made him shrink from further grilling cross examination, J. K. Thomas this morning confessed to shooting his wife and afterward burying the body. The crime, he says, was committed during the progress of a drunken quarrel between them and he asserts that his wife was armed at the time and was trying to shoot him when he fired upon her. Said Thomas in his confession:

"Just as I was leaving she pulled a gun from under her dress and fired at me. I turned and shot her twice and she said 'My God' and fell. I went and picked the body up and laid it on the bed and then I think I must have gone to sleep for I did not wake up till 9 o'clock the next morning when I found myself lying on the bed with the body beside me. I shall plead self defense."

On the morning following the murder he says he went down town and became beastly drunk. It was not until two days later, he says, that he went back and buried the body.

Mrs. Rice repeated the main details of her story exactly as she related it on the direct examination. Counsel for Davis failed to shake her testimony on any important feature.
