### SCHOOL DISTRICTS ARE CHANGED BY BOARD

A matter of considerable importance to parents of school children was decided upon by the school board at its last meeting in the establishment of school boundaries. The city has been entirely redistricted and the board insists upon the strict observance of the new boundaries. The district are as follows:

**Central School.** Beginning at a point where Capitol street crosses North Mill creek, thence south on Capitol street through the state house grounds and the university grounds to Trade street, thence west to Winter street, thence south on Winter street to the most northerly branch of South Mill creek, thence down said branch to its junction with South Mill creek at Church street bridge, thence down South Mill creek to the Willamette river, thence down Willamette river to the mouth of North Mill creek, thence up North Mill creek to place of beginning.

**North School.** Beginning at a point where Capitol street crosses North Mill creek, thence north on Capitol street to D street, thence east on D street to Sixteenth street, thence north on Sixteenth street to the most northerly northwest corner of Englewood addition thence easterly along the north boundary of Englewood addition to the northeast corner of said addition, thence east and parallel to the D street county road to the east boundary line of school district No. 24, thence northerly and westerly following the boundary line of school district No. 24 to the Willamette river, thence up the Willamette river to the mouth of North Mill creek, thence up North Mill creek to place of beginning.

**East School.** Beginning at a point where Capitol street crosses North Mill creek, thence north to D street, thence east on D street to Sixteenth street, thence north on Sixteenth street to the most northerly northwest corner of Englewood addition, thence easterly along the north boundary of said addition to the northwest corner of said addition, thence east and parallel with the D street county road to the east line of school district No. 24, thence south along the boundary line of school district No. 24 to Mill creek, thence down Mill creek to where the same crosses Twenty-fifth street, thence westerly along said street to Capitol street, thence north through the university and state house grounds to place of beginning.

Beginning at the Church street bridge on South Mill creek, thence up

the most southerly branch of South Mill creek through the blind school grounds and the lands of A. Bush to where said branch crosses Berry street, thence south on Berry street to the northeast corner of Pleasant Home addition, thence westerly along the north boundary of Pleasant Home addition to Fifth street, thence southerly on Fifth street to Tuxedo Park addition, thence due south through Tuxedo Park addition and Nob Hill annex to the south line of school district No. 24, thence easterly and northerly following the boundary of school district No. 24 to Mill creek, thence down Mill creek to where the same crosses Twenty-fifth street, thence westerly along Trade street to Winter street, thence south on Winter street to the most northerly branch of South Mill creek, thence down said branch to the Church street bridge, the place of beginning.

**Lincoln School.** Beginning at the Church street bridge on South Mill creek, thence up the most southerly branch of South Mill creek through the blind school grounds and the lands of A. Bush to where the same crosses Berry street, thence south on Berry street to the northeast corner of Pleasant Home addition, thence westerly along the north boundary of said addition to Fifth street, thence south on Fifth street to Tuxedo Park addition, thence due south through Tuxedo Park addition and Nob Hill annex to the south line of school district No. 24, thence westerly following the boundary of school district No. 24 to the Willamette river, thence down said river to the mouth of South Mill creek, thence up said creek to the Church street bridge, the place of beginning.
