

EAST DEMANDS

OREGON FRUIT

(The Dalles Chronicle.) Much impressed with the conditions of the west in general, as compared with the east, C. A. Buckley, of Grass Valley, Sherman county, an extensive stock and wheat grower, has returned from a month's visit to New York and eastern states.

Mr. Buckley was in the city today when he spoke most optimistically of the future of Oregon as to its products. He says that there is a great demand for the products of this state in the east, particularly for the Oregon apples.

The Sherman county man says that since he visited the east that he is assured that the high prices which Oregon people are receiving for their products will be maintained and that the worst kind of panic could not lower them, greatly, as some contend.

He speaks very favorably of crop conditions in this state, and taking apples as an illustration, said:

"New York, you know, was a great apple state and may be so considered now, but it is a fact that most of the apples raised there now are only good for making cider and vinegar of them. They are wormy and de-fected in general.

"The people there demand Oregon apples for as one big New York apple merchant expressed the situation, 'we want apples we can eat in the dark,' the kind of fruit they know is not wormy and is sound.

"Some people say that the high prices which are received here for apples and the other crops will not continue. After visiting the east I am convinced that they will. The country is gradually becoming dependent upon the west for many products, apples in particular for the eastern supply is gradually diminishing and there is no reason to believe that prices will decrease. They will increase if anything."

Mr. Buckley, who is one of the Sherman county committeemen for the district fair which will be held here October 6 to 10, says that his county will be well represented this year. He will exhibit some very fine blooded stock. The people of Sherman county are taking much interest in the coming event, according to Mr. Buckley, and a big crowd from that district will be in attendance.

In speaking of agricultural fairs in general, Mr. Buckley said that they do a great deal of good for any community, in many ways that the people do not realize. Probably the biggest benefit received is the advertising which a city or district derives from the fairs.

"You can expect to hear from Sherman county, at the district fair," said Mr. Buckley, just before he left for home this morning. "Our people are going to support it this year more generously than ever before."

Price, fitness and quality being equal, preference will be given to articles manufactured, grown or produced in this state. When a particular article is specifically called for, bids on other kind, manufacture or brand equally good will be entertained, but to insure recognition of such bids, samples of the articles it is proposed to supply must accompany them.

The board reserves the right to reject and or all bids, or to accept or reject any part of a bid. Bids will be opened at the Capitol at Salem, at 10 a. m., Tuesday, October 6, 1908.
