ARRESTED FOR STARTING CALIFORNIA FOREST FIRES

Portland, Or., Oct. 1.—Louis R. Webb, a hunter and trapper, who is interested in Southern Oregon mines, accused of having set fire to several thousand acres of government timber in Northern California, is in the county jail in Portland, where he has engaged attorneys to fight extradition to San Francisco. He was brought here last night from Klamath county by Deputy United States Marshal Nicholson.

Webb was taken before a United States commissioner, and the amount of bail placed at \$5000. Unable to give bond, Webb is now in the Multnomah county jail, awaiting the order of removal to California for trial.

Webb claims that his arrest is "a case of solte work at the hands of some of his enemies." He asserts that he did not start forest fires.

It is alleged by the California government agents that during August Webb deliberately and maliciously set fire to timber lands in Northern California, and that as a result of his action the timber on practically four entire townships was burned ruined.

FLEET 300 MILES OUT FROM MANILA

Manila, Oct. 1.—Wireless messages received from the Atlantic fleet this afternoon indicate that the American warships are less than 300 miles away, and, at the present rate of 11 knots per hour, they should be here early Friday afternoon.

The cholera situation has improved and the officials here are exceptionally hopeful that the disease will be sufficiently under control by the time the fleet returns from Japan to remove all idea of giving up the public reception. Many persons are of the opinion, however, that the authorities are not fully justified in this expectation.

On the first visit the fleet will spend most of the time at Cavite, where the vessels will be coaled. The fleet will sail from Cavite on October 10 for Yokohama.
