### FIXING RATES FOR THROUGH SHIPMENT

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco, Oct. 1.—The tariff on goods from the Orient through shipment to New York which will go into effect the first of next month, is being figured out today, following the arrival yesterday of a schedule printed by the Interstate Commerce Commission, stating the rate that the trans-continental railroads shall receive as their share of the haul.

The commission has declared that the railroads must make public the amount they receive for their share of the haul, and this necessitates the raising of the rate, say the railroad companies, or losing the business.

Heretofore the railroads and steamship lines have split the rate to suit themselves.

The railroads say that the steamship companies got a large portion of the rate, to enable them to compete with foreign vessels on the Pacific.

### JAPS WATCH MILITARY MANEUVERS

Camp Atascadero, Cal., Oct. 1.—The presence of several Japanese here watching the maneuvers of the troops has led to the rumor that they are spies looking for information as to American military activity, but the story was denied at headquarters today.

The Japanese have been here for several days watching the troops and the work of the artillery.

There are no lines about the camp through which a civilian cannot pass, and no restrictions have been placed on onlookers as to watching the maneuvers. There is no way at present to prevent the Japanese from watching the maneuvers, if they wish to do so.

### Wright Gets Prize.

Paris, France, Oct. 1.—The Aero club today sent to Wilbur Wright the Ohio aviator, a check for \$1000 as a prize for having made the longest flight ever having been accomplished. The flight on which the award is based, was officially recognized to have continued one hour, seven minutes and eleven and one-fourth seconds. The club expresses its high admiration for Wright, and its confidence in his machine.
