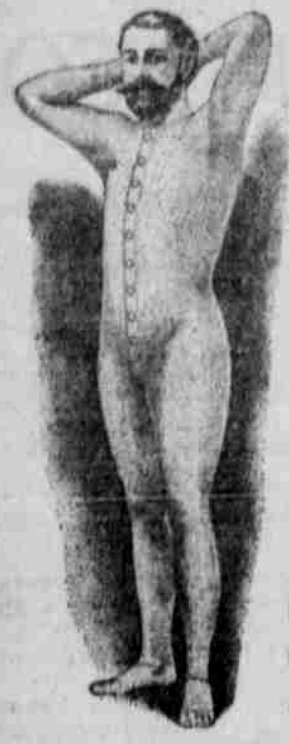

**Normal Regents' Meeting**— A meeting of the regents of the state normal schools has been called by Governor Chamberlain, to take place on October 10.

**Remanded to Jail**— Ed. Sweeney, who stole a bolt of cloth from Stockton's store, has been remanded, by Judge Bushy, to jail, in default of bail until his trial.

**Schedule for Yew Park**— The people of Yew Park will be furnished with a 10-minute schedule, declares Manager Page of the local street car company. They will also be given a waiting room.

**Marriage Licenses**— Marriage licenses have been granted as follows: Lee S. Hyde and Miss Edna Bridges, both of Salem. William F. Massey, of Brooks, and Miss Olive Wilson, of Salem.

**Delinquency Not Advertised**— No advertisement of delinquency is necessary under the new tax law, which becomes active October 6. The sheriff's office is looking for a rush of work in consequence.

**Pickpockets Held**— Frank Fallain and Ed. McIntire are suspected of being pickpockets, and are being held by Acting Recorder Elgin for further developments.

**Salem Hunters Out**— A large number of Salem sports will leave for the different hunting grounds of Marion county today and tomorrow. The season opened this morning, and there have been 1429 hunters' licenses issued since the first of the year.

**Salem Heights Line**— The running of street cars to Salem Heights has been placed before the executive board of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, but, according to local officials, the outcome is in doubt.

**Stops Runaway**— "Doc" Hamilton, well-known about town, this morning played the

hero in stopping a team which had started to run away down Commercial street near State. Despite the warnings of bystanders, "Doc" grabbed the horses by their bits and brought them to a stop. The vehicle, a light wagon, was filled with fruit.

**Railway to Improve**— The Portland Railway, Light & Power Company's plans for extensions and improvements seem assured by the purchase of a tract of land adjoining the present site for \$1400.

**Bicycle Thief Caught**— James L. Lowery, who is wanted for stealing a bicycle from in front of the Willamette Sanitarium, has been taken by the Portland police, and Sheriff Minto went after him this morning.

**No One in Jail**— Chief Gibson held a house cleaning this morning, and emptied his jail of all occupants, the first time since the opening of the state fair.

**Cleaning Fair Grounds**— Convicts are at work cleaning up the rubbish left by the recent campers at the state fair grounds. A part of their work will be pulling up some 6000 stakes used for the tents.

**Express Company Answers**— Wells-Fargo, through their attorneys, Snow & McCamant, of Portland, filed their reply to the complaint of B. F. Jones, of Independence, who claimed he had been charged illegal rates. The company avers the charge is false, and asks the Railroad Commission to dismiss the same.

They are to co-operate with the United States geographic board, and select names for lakes, streams, valleys and mountains of Oregon, to prevent the using of inappropriate names, and to use names that will perpetuate the Indian and early pioneer names.

**ASK FOR TROOPS TO CAPTURE DESPERADOES** (United Press Leased Wire.)

Richmond, Va., Oct. 1.—Sheriff Williams, of Buckingham county, started today at the head of a posse of 100 men in an effort to capture a band of desperadoes who killed N. M. Gregory, a prominent citizen of Buckingham county, last Saturday and have held the officers at bay near Arvona ever since.

An appeal was sent to the governor for troops, after a sharp fight between officers and the outlaws last night, in which a number of shots were exchanged, but, so far as is known, no one was hurt.

The outlaws are led by two men named Thomas and Zimmerman, who are known to be desperate characters. Reports received here say that Gregory was shot down in cold blood.
