

NEW BABY OUTFITS

There must be a whole army of people planning and working to supply the needs of small strangers from Baby-Land. Nothing more fascinating can be imagined than the display of such wares made at the various high grade shops and at the exchanges.

Dainty Simplicity. Daintiness, combined with practical simplicity, is the most notable feature of all these baby outfits. Where lavish expenditure is indulged it goes for fine materials, and exquisite needlework and embroidery rather than for fussy elaboration which is reckoned altogether bad taste in a layette.

The Long Clothes. Sensible people confide their selection of the long clothes worn during the first six months of the baby's existence to a plentiful supply of little slips of nice material untrimmed except for lace at neck and sleeves and to the necessary long flannel skirts for day and night wear which may be of the finest, softest flannel daintily embroidered or simply finished with feather-stitched hems. They wait until short clothes are donned to provide regulation dresses and more elaborate apparel.

Acceptable Presents. Little wrappers and nightgale sacks of cashmere prettily embroidered are favorite presents always acceptable, and one is sure to receive a few hand made dresses suitable for any important occasions, like the christening or Christmas holiday gathering, when the baby is to be very much in evidence. All sorts of warm knitted blankets, and afghans and wraps of embroidered flannel, or tatted silk, are useful and attractive gifts, that add to the comfort and pleasure of the recipients.

The Best Styles in Skirts and Shirts. Little woven shirts of fine ribbed material that button down the front like coats are the best style garments in this class. These are all wool, silk or mixtures and have a tab at the lower front edge to hold the shield pin and keep the baby's garments together so that they will be smooth and not slip, thus adding materially to his comfort.

Short Clothes for Girls and Boys. At six months most babies are put into short clothes and the wise mother has the first flannels, etc., of a length that will cut into two garments of the same sort. From the time when short clothes are donned fashion decrease that the boys' outfit shall be marked by a certain simplicity of style and tailor-like finishes and trimmings to proclaim his place and differentiate it from the girlish daintiness proper to his sisters.

A Practical Suggestion. At six months mothers are apt to have an anxious, and babies a most uncomfortable time, for this is the period when the weaning is usually accomplished. An easy way to get over this, is to begin giving the baby one or two daily feedings of a high grade, prepared baby food like Nestle's in connection with his natural sustenance. Most children need additional feeding after the first three months, some over earlier, and if this plan is followed, the child is so accustomed to the scientifically prepared food, that the weaning can be made without any fretting or physical disturbance.

double-faced, blue and white, or pink and white, bound with ribbon matching the color and tied with soft bows of the same. ARMORED FIRE DOORS FOR WAREHOUSES

Consul Church Howe sends from Manchester the following description of the armored door which is taking the place of the iron door in British warehouses and factories:

Within the last few years a great change has been taking place in the materials employed for the construction of fire-resisting doors. Formerly it was supposed that these doors must be made of iron or steel, and although doors made of these materials were often found useless, owing to their liability to buckle, and consequently to tear themselves from their fastenings when exposed to extreme heat, it is only comparatively lately that a really effective substitute has been discovered.

Although the iron door is still made use of occasionally in all classes of buildings, and I understand with comparative frequency in Manchester warehouses, one finds that in building designed for manufacturing purposes, and especially in textile factories, the armored door is rapidly taking its place and giving satisfaction.

The armored type of fire door is constructed of several thicknesses of well-seasoned pine boards, planed, tongued and grooved, and nailed together with wrought iron nails driven flush and clinched on the other side. The wood is then completely covered with tinned steel sheets of no less than No. 28 standard wire gauge, each sheet being of a limited size, lock jointed and fitting close to the wood, so that while free to expand, they exclude the air and cannot become detached.

By this means combustion is prevented, and it is found that an exposure of several hours to the fiercest heat results only in the surface of the outer boards becoming slightly carbonized to the depth of a fraction of an inch.
