REMARKABLE GAIN IN O. A. C. REGISTRATION

When the O. A. C. threw open its doors for registration of students, there was the greatest rush ever seen at an Oregon college. The line-up in front of the financial secretary's office was indeed, a lengthy one, many students having been in line for many hours, and groups were coming and going in all directions. The fact that nearly 1000 students had registered by October 1, shows there has certainly been some work going on in the registration department, and taking into consideration the rate of increase as experienced last year, we shall have a total registration of from 1500 to 1600 during the school year, 1908-09, making this the leading school in the great northwest.

PRUNE CROP LIGHT BUT OF GOOD QUALITY

According to prune men in this section of Oregon the prune crop is now progressing satisfactorily, though growers experienced considerable trouble a week ago because the fruit was slow in ripening. Many prune growers began drying their fruit about the middle of September, but were compelled to shut down their dryers because the prunes did not ripen fast enough. Indications now are that the remainder of the crop will be gathered and cared without further delay unless a prolonged rain should set in. Rain at this time would do considerable damage to the prune crop by causing the fruit to crack and starting mold on the fruit that lies on the ground.

PIERCE FIRE BURNING IN SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, Oct. 5.—Fire, threatening with destruction the Beale street wharf and adjacent property valued at \$500,000, started early today in the coal bunkers of the Pacific Coast Coal Company, at Beale and Bryant streets. Tons of coal in the bunkers along the wharf are burning fiercely, and the terrific heat prevents the firemen from approaching to do effective work. The first alarm brought an engine a block away, but at the time of its arrival the flames had destroyed the offices of the company at the land end of the pier and were attacking the pier sheds and warehouses along the water front.

HAS NO TENDERLOIN FOR FIRST TIME IN GENERATION

What has always been considered the impossible has practically happened. Pendleton's tenderloin district has all but been wiped out. The drastic order of Mayor Murphy, issued one week ago this morning,

has had a better and more far-reaching effect than the mayor or any of the councilmen dreamed that it would have when made.

The order was to the effect that all women occupying the row of one-story shacks on Cottonwood street between Alta and Webb streets, and those occupying the ground floors of the two-story buildings should be required to move out. Also that the lattice work in front of these buildings should be torn out and that the rooms on the ground floors of the two-story buildings must be torn out so they could no longer be used for bawdy house purposes.

While it was hoped that this order would have the effect of causing some of the denizens of this part of town to seek locations elsewhere it was supposed that the most of them would find accommodations on the second floors of the two-story buildings in that neighborhood. Such does not seem to have been the case, however, for large numbers of them have been seen to leave the city on recent trains, and it was announced by Chief of Police Gurdane this afternoon that all but four of them had left town altogether.

Since this is a more satisfactory solution of the problem than even the most ardent leaders of the movement against this class of people had hoped for and it is now believed that the agitation will be dropped. The result of the mayor's orders are considered the more remarkable since it has always been argued that it would be impossible to rid the city of this class of people, it being merely possible to scatter them. It is generally admitted, however, that the voting of the county dry and the eliminating of the saloons with the enforcement of the prohibition law has had a great influence in causing the general exodus.

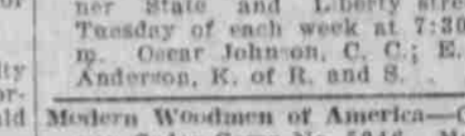
