## EXAMINING BOARD FINDS AGAINST STEWART

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Washington, Oct. 5.—The special retiring board of the army today decided against Colonel William F. Stewart, the famous Fort Grant exile, and sustained the report of the surgeon at Fort Huachuca, Arizona, who had afflicted with serious ailments since 1875, when it was necessary for him to refrain from active service for a time. This indicates that Governor Stewart will be found by the board to be incapable of service, and probably will result in his being retired on that ground. The case has been pending here now for nearly a week, before the special board.

## DIED.

**O'BRIEN.**—Near Turner, Oregon. October 4, 1908, after an illness of two weeks, James O'Brien, aged 16.  
He was a very bright boy, parentage unknown, and was placed with the Sisters of St. Mary at Beaverton, when one year of age, remaining in their care for 13 years, then was with the Sisters at St. Louis one year. He was sent to the reform school July 1, 1908, as he was becoming wayward and getting beyond their control. James was a delicate boy, and gradually failed in health, dying finally of internal hemorrhage. The funeral will take place at the school, Father Springer officiating.

## BANK EXAMINERS DELAY TOO LONG

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Washington, D. C., Oct. 5.—Lawrence O. Murray, controller of the currency, today declared that the common fault of national bank examiners is that they delay too long in closing the bank entrusted to their care.  
He addressed 16 examiners today at a meeting to which they were summoned to attend. The conference will last a week.
