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FARMERS TALK ON CURE FOR SMUT

While the rain fall in the immediate vicinity of Pendleton has not been sufficient to sprout the seeds of weeds on the summer-fallow and to make the beginning of fall seeding advisable, yet there has been plenty of moisture in many wheat growing sections of Umatilla and Morrow counties, accordingly the problem of how to prepare the wheat for seeding in order to get the best results is uppermost in the minds of all farmers.

No problem is more generally vexing to wheat farmers than the problem of smut. Some claim to have this evil completely overcome and a few general directions from such will be of universal interest to the farmers of this section.

T. J. Tweedy of this city says that he has conquered smut and also R. W. Hickok, of Morrow county, has been successful in combating the evil. The following directions given out by Mr. Hickok and in general corroborated by Mr. Tweedy will be of value to all farmers.

"Smut is a live plant, a parasite growing on other plants like wheat, barley, oats, etc., of which the smut dust is the seed or germ. Everything that lives and grows has some place where the conditions are favorable for its growth and development and when conditions become unfavorable the life of that particular thing is extinct.

"Vitrill water is death to the smut germ; but I have learned from many wheat growers in Morrow county that they do not use the vitrill as I would suggest. We must admit that dry wheat in bags can be left uncovered and take much rain and not absorb enough moisture to prevent wheat from being merchantable, at least in this climate, and yet they expect every kernel to be surrounded by vitrill water by five minutes immersion in a sack in a barrel.

"I say it will not do. Wheat in a sack in a barrel is so closely packed that every kernel must, at some point touch other kernels so closely as to prevent the vitrill water passing between, and if at this point there is a smut seed kept from contact with the water it would not be killed.

"By pouring wheat in the vitrill water every kernel is completely surrounded by water, especially if you stir it well. Build a trough, say 14 or 16 inches wide 12 feet long. Place 20 to 25 pounds of vitrill in a grain bag and place it in one end of the trough. Fill trough with six inches of water. Pour in a sack of wheat, stir well, skim off the white straw, straws and other refuse. At one end of the trough place a drain board, scoop up the wheat and allow the same to drain, the water passing back into the trough.

"Fanning Mill Not Needed. In this country we find very little foreign substance in the wheat in the way of wild seeds. One man can vitrill and skim more wheat in this manner than he could clean with a fanning mill and more than he could vitrill in a barrel and the

wheat is left in good condition for the drill in its passage down the tubes for seeding. And I would further suggest that the sacks in which the wheat is placed after vitrilling should be immersed in vitrill water. As there may be smut germs sticking to the sack. Especially second hand sacks.

"It don't pay to raise smut. There is danger to explosion of threshing outfits, disagreeable to work in and a loss in the price of the grain. Hundreds of dollars would be saved to growers of this country in using more precaution in an endeavor to kill the smut, which seems that the conditions in this country are favorable to the growth of smut. The only point in this statement to which Mr. Tweedy takes exceptions is that relating to skimming the wheat to get rid of chaff and weed seeds. He insists that the fanning mill is of great value to the farmer. The point emphasized especially by Mr. Tweedy is that relating to getting the entire sack under water in vitrilling. He also says that great mistake is often made of storing the wheat which is to be used for seed in granaries with all sorts of rubbish and musty sacks where germs lurk by the thousands.

SIXTEEN BEEF CATTLE SINK ON FERRY BARGE

By a little maneuvering with the gasoline launch he was able to head all of them toward the west side, where they were corralled and driven to the city. (United Press Leased Wire.) Stanford University, Cal., Oct. 6.—County officers are quietly looking today for a supposed maniac, who attacked a party of picnicking co-eds in the hills back of the University last Friday. Twenty pretty girls, members of the Mantelista Club, among whom were the two daughters of Governor Gillett, became the target for clods, earth and sticks in the hands of the frenzied man.

Owing to the prominence of the young women every effort was made to prevent the attack from becoming known. The girls were gathered at San Francisquito creek, when the intruder sprang at them, brandishing a stick. Then he began throwing clods and stones. As they huddled in a frightened group, he set the dry brush afire, but the girls extinguished the flames with earth. In the meantime, two of the girls, by hiding in the undergrowth, succeeded in escaping. They reached the home of President Jordan, but it was empty. Frantic with fear for the safety of their companions, they telephoned to the power house for help, directing the rescuers to Robie bridge, the scene of the attack. By mistake the rescuers went to Robie hall, but the girls escaped their assault in the darkness.
