## GLASGOW'S CIVIC LANDS HELD FOR HIGHER VALUES

According to a statement of a correspondent of the Pal Mail Gazette in London, the corporation of Glasgow has a lot of land lying idle which is not to be utilized, but is apparently being held for a rise in values.

The declared value of that ground at present nearly \$600,000. To hold this, with the charge of 3 per cent, costs the city \$17,800, and the net revenue is only \$3870. After deducting rates and cost of management there is an annual deficit of \$1,000 to \$15,000, and to that extent the rates are burdened.

Dealing with the question whether the land, if held, will appreciate to an extent, the report goes on to say that owing to the trend of legislation and the prospect of heavy land taxation, building land has fallen much in value. The building industry, while now depressed, was for many years very prosperous, but the ground was fairly taken up by the owners, the corporation being held for random sale were little sought after.

The arbitrary prices demanded for ground and the views held by a number of the members of the town council are responsible for our present serious condition. The present members of the council are not responsible for the mischievous high priced policy pursued and adhered to. This policy was initiated by the Glasgow Improvement Trust. They bought up lands for impossible prices, and that way seriously impaired the resources and retarded the development of the city as a whole.

The City Improvement Trust, however, is simply one of the departments of the corporation. More than that, it is a department of which the principal authorities used to be municipal officials. The work and the results of the City Improvement Trust were among Glasgow's municipal boasts, and it must have required the courage on the part of the present committee to arraign this municipal department. The report states plainly that the policy pursued has been responsible in a great measure for the fact that there are no vacant houses in Glasgow, besides leaving the corporation with an unprofitable ground, and adds pointedly that opportunity has been lost for turning the latter to immediate account.

The population has gone beyond the boundaries to find houses built on "chaper ground," with the result that the city has held and still holds 296,000 or 300,000 square feet of convenient and desirable building ground uncovered.

It is suggested that by altering the policy of the corporation and putting the city lands as regards the building conditions "on a par with a fair comparison with other cities," something in the way of revenue might be required toward the reduction of the present annual deficit of \$14,000 or \$15,000. But that is a reflection on the "highly laudable" seal of the Glasgow landowners is this proposal that the corporation of the city should endeavor to imitate the fairness of the "other landlords" whom the owners have so long held up to glory.

**The Staff of the Governor.**

The cloakroom of the senate, says Mr. Schurz, "where senators passed one another with the gossip of the day, continued to buzz with the latest about President Grant's notions of the nature and

functions of civil government. One of these anecdotes, told by a senator who was considered one of the best lawyers in that body and one of the most zealous of the character of his profession, was particularly significant. He heard a rumor that President Grant was about to remove a federal judge in one of the territories of the United States. The senator happened to know that the judge was a lawyer of excellent ability and uncommon fitness for the bench, and he went to the President to remonstrate against so extreme a measure as the removal of a judge unless there were cogent reasons for it connected with the administration of the office.

"President Grant admitted that as far as he knew there was no allegation of the unfitness of the judge, 'but,' he added, 'the governor of the territory writes me that he cannot get along with that judge at all and is very anxious to be rid of him, and I think the governor is entitled to have control of his staff.' The senator closed his story by saying that he found it to be a delicate as well as a difficult job to make the great general in the chair of the President of the United States understand how different the relations between a territorial governor and a federal judge were from those between a military commander and his staff officers. The anecdote was received by the listeners with a laugh, but the mirth was not far from head-shaking apprehension. However, there being sincere and perfect good will on both sides, things went on pleasantly in the expectation that the military hero at the head of the government would learn what he needed to know and that the men in political places of power would treat him with due consideration and fairness.—McClure's.

**TESTING OF WOOD WITH THE MICROSCOPE**

A new line of work consisting of the microscopic examination of wood after it breaks in a testing apparatus, has just been started by the office of wood utilization in the United States forest service.

The structure of wood is complex. Every species has several different kinds of cells, each of which has its own size and form. There is also a wide variation in the number and arrangement of the cells in different species. These differences structure have their bearing on the strength of the wood.

For some time past the forest

service has been carrying on a large number of tests on many kinds of wood in order to determine their strength, stiffness, elasticity, and other physical properties, so that they may be used to the best possible advantage in construction. The application of microscopic work to such tests should give a better knowledge of the conditions on which the strength of wood depends.

Laymen will not understand the significance of the proposed microscopic investigations so quickly as architects, builders and other wood users, who, in these days of growing scarcity of the more valuable woods, will find the knowledge invaluable.

Other problems connected with the structure of wood, such as the preparation of wood pulp and the treatment of wood with preservatives, will no doubt be aided by this new study.

**PINE OIL AND SOME OF ITS IMPORTANT USES**

A striking example of a seemingly useless waste product of the forest which has developed into a marketable commodity of no small importance is what is known as pine oil.

The crude wood turpentine obtained from the steam distillation of certain species of pine must be refined with considerable care before it can be sold in competition with gum spirits, the true turpentine of commerce. By redistillation with steam this crude product is usually separated into two substances. The first, which is the larger fraction, consists almost entirely of the product known technically as "pineene." This closely resembles gum turpentine, except for a barely perceptible difference in odor.

The other fraction is a product somewhat thicker and heavier than turpentine, with a yellow color and a very pleasant odor. This is known as "pine oil."

Formerly this by-product had no market and was either burned or sold for almost nothing in order to get rid of it. It was realized, however, that it was extremely poor business to waste three or more gallons of oil for every cord of wood without knowing certainly whether the oil was of value, and it was clearly to the chemist to find uses for pine oil and to the salesman to create a market.

Pine oil is now sold in tank cars lots to manufacturers of roofing and varnishes. Considerable quantities are consumed in the manufacture of insulating materials, metal polishes and cheap perfumes. It has been found to yield very cheaply "terpene hydrate," a drug which at present is manufactured by somewhat costly methods. Pine oil has also been suggested as an excellent solvent for varnish gums for the production of light-colored varnishes. Further investigation may even lead to its use as a raw material in the production of artificial camphor.

Thus, from a worthless product, pine oil has so much increased in value that refined grades may now be sold for from 40 to 50 cents a gallon. The very lowest grades sell for about 10 cents a gallon.
