ANOTHER SCHOOL ROOM ADDED ON

At a special meeting of the Board of Education, held last night, it was decided to add another room and teacher in the East school, where some of the rooms are overflowing, one teacher having 58 pupils.

The new room will be finished off in the basement, and will be well lighted and comfortable.

A new building is badly needed, and it was a mistake not to have put it up this fall, when labor and materials were cheaper than they may be next year.

The board may be compelled to finish off a room in the Lincoln school and transfer some of the surplus school population from the Park school.

BETTER STREET CAR SERVICE

Superintendent Page says on Friday the long-promised ten-minute car service on the Yew Park line will be in effect.

In a short time a 22-minute service will go on State street, instead of the half-hour service, as at present.

As soon as the overhead and track work are completed on the South Salem and Fair Grounds line a 15-minute service will be installed there. Cars will pass at Daus's store and Hood street.

DECISIONS OF THE SUPREME COURT

The supreme court handed down an unusual large number of decisions yesterday. The hop case of Callin & Linn Jones vs. Jones, which went up to the higher court in the form of an appeal to recover damages from breach of contract was reversed and remanded for further proceedings.

In the case of the Carlton Lumber Co., vs. D. P. Trullinger and Carl Trullinger, the court enjoined the lumber company from further use of slash dams to float logs down the Yamhill river as the floating of logs in this district interferes with the general supply of water power.

Eliza Carroff, administratrix of the estate of Leonard Carroll, deceased, vs. Grand Ronde Electric company, an appeal from a decision made by Judge William Smith, Union county, affirmed; opinion by Chief Justice Bean.

Ellen Jones vs. California & Oregon Land Co., appeal from decision of Judge H. L. Benson, Lake county, affirmed by Justice Eakin.

A. M. Holmes vs. Pierce Riggs, appeal from decision of Judge Burnett; affirmed; opinion by Chief Justice Bean.

Will R. King vs. William Miller, appeal from a decision of Judge George E. Davis of Malheur county; affirmed; opinion by Chief Justice Bean.

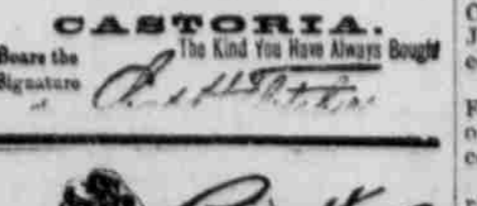
BIBLE SOCIETY SPLIT RESULTS IN SHOOTING
San Jose, Cal., Oct. 7.—Claiming that the adherents of an opposing sect are seeking his life, A. O. Florey, one of the leaders of the San Jose Bible and Tract Society, today sought the protection of the sheriff.

Florey declares that yesterday morning he was awakened by the report of a gun, and that a bullet chipped the plaster of his room within a foot of his head. The man who fired the shot ran before Florey or neighbors could pursue. He says he saw a man lurking in the shadows near his home last night.

The leader attributes the shooting to a recent falling out between factions in the Bible and Tract Society. He declared that a faction headed by L. D. Dement is antagonistic to him, and recently attempted to depose him to elect Dement.
