RAILROAD LAWS.

between the Great Lakes and the Gulf of Mexico is a matter of national and even international importance. It is not opposed to the development of the railroads of the country. The greatest obstacle now confronting the railroads is the provision of adequate terminals.

The opening of this waterway from 1000 miles of ocean harbor every point of which will be accessible for railroad terminals.

The railroads are the backbone of transportation. It is impossible to strike a blow at the railroads without hitting the canals, and the greatest danger the country faces to the physical operation of railroads is by commissions.

We now have public service commissions in New York which superintend and control the railroads, with the result that railroad development in New York is dead.

The menace is in the law itself. It is not more than to see this condition prominent as a railroad man, I would prefer government ownership of railroads.

The solution of the problem of railroad development rests with the railroads a square mile.

A. Osborn, of St. Louis, in an address before the convention today outlined his tour of investigation of the waterways and declared that all doubt of the feasibility of opening the Mississippi to an extent to meet the demands of commerce had been removed.

He referred to the natural advantages of waterways in the United States over those of Europe, where the difficulties are confronted.

pointment of a committee to thoroughly investigate the channel in the Mare Island navy yard and report at the next session of the congress as the feasibility of providing a channel deep enough for the large ships in the navy.

A law compelling corporations and individuals owning land in the forest regions of the west to adopt a fire fighting system similar to that of the government in the National forests is recommended in a resolution by Lewis E. Aubury, and it is probable that the resolution will be adapted. Governor Pardee in a strong address favored the resolution.

Major Green startled the congress today by the introduction of a resolution providing for a government owned railway from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast. He declared that the completion of the Panama Canal will make such a railway an imperative necessity if we are to have low railroad rates.

Henry C. Willerton, a well-known resident of The Dalles, died at his home in that city yesterday at the age of 57.
