Sanitary Milk—A. C. Fleming has established a sanitary milk service and is building up an exclusive business in this line. His dairy is east of the state hospital about a mile. The cows are brushed twice a day, kept clean in their quarters. The stables and yards are absolutely clean. The cows are milked into a covered sanitary pail, the milk is cooled in bottles and sealed for delivery with a heavy paper cap. The glass bottles are cleaned with hot water, soap and brush then rinsed in warm water and cold water. A test of this milk will satisfy anyone that it is a great improvement.

Albany, Or., Oct. 8.—The Albany Commercial Club met last night and a committee of three was appointed to investigate the matter of establishing a hose factory, which Mr. Caldwell is running at Stayton. He is anxious to locate in Albany, and wants the Albany citizens to take stock.
Mr. Schuller, an unexperienced employe of the Albany sawmill, had his middle finger cut off this morning while at work.

REBUILDING ST. MARK'S CAMPANILE OF VENICE

The rebuilding of the Campanile of Venice has made progress during the last two months, and has now attained a height of 150 feet.

By the end of 1909 the main portion of the tower will be finished and the marble loggia, which will amount the column, will be commenced. This time ample precautions have been taken to insure strength and stability of the Campanile.

The old pilework was found to be in an excellent state of preservation. A gilded state of the Virgin in terra cotta, which was a special object of veneration, and which was referred to fragments in the falling of the tower, has been cleverly put together again by experts and will occupy actively its former position.
