#### IMPORTANT MEASURES. (Continued From Page 1.)

- 4.—The improvement of Humboldt Bay.
- 5.—An appropriation of \$250,000 for the improvement of Oakland harbor.
- 6.—An appropriation of \$400,000 for the improvement of the Sacramento and Feather rivers, California, to be expended by the California Dredge commission when the state of California raises \$400,000.
- 7.—An appropriation of \$284,800 for the improvement of San Pedro harbor.
- 8.—The improvement and fortification of Coos Bay harbor.
- 9.—The improvement of Salslaw harbor, Oregon.
- 10.—The construction of a breakwater at Pacific Grove, California.
- 11.—The improvement of Monterey harbor.
- 12.—Endorsement of the work of the public health and marine hospital service.
- 13.—The aiding of the American merchant marine by the federal government.
- 14.—The protection of the domestic sugar industry by a tariff on foreign sugar.
- 15.—A one-way round trip fare to Seattle during the Alaska-Youkon-Pacific exposition.
- 16.—A government owned line of steamships between all Pacific coast ports and Panama and South America unless the Pacific Mail improves its service.
- 17.—Empowering the interstate commerce commission to suspend in advance, increases in freight rates, pending an investigation as to their reasonableness.
- 18.—The revision of the tariff on a reciprocal basis.
- 19.—Laws providing less stringent rules for grazing on public lands and a lower rate of rental to be applied to the public schools of the districts in which the lands are located.
- 20.—Endorsing the work of the International Bureau of American republics and calling for legislation for the improvement of steamship and mail facilities between the United States and South America.
- 21.—The revocation of the ruling prohibiting the use of American sweet wines in medicine and against the reduction of the tariff on wines.
- 22.—Providing for the control of water and power rights in public lands by the state or nation and the making of the granting of power rights conditional on the prompt completion of the work.
- 23.—The maintenance of a large fleet in the Pacific ocean.
- 24.—To compel the opening of Bayou, La Fouché in Louisiana.
- 25.—The improvement of the Arkansas river as far as Muskogee.
- 26.—The construction of trails in government forest reserves and a system of prevention of forest fires similar to the government regulations in national forests.
- 27.—Endorsing the Geological survey.
- 28.—The revision of the tariff so as to encourage industry in the Philippines.
- 29.—The establishment of a national bureau of mines.
- 30.—The construction of roads by National and state corporation.

### A NARROW ESCAPE.

cigarette, though blood was trickling from a gash on his chin. The mechanic was unhurt.

The closing day of Founder's week is being given over mainly to athletic contests and the Knights' Templar festival in addition to the auto races, which proved the most popular attraction of the week.

### Fast Racing.

Thirty-five stock racing automobiles of all classes entered the races today preliminary to the great Vanderbilt cup race which will take place on October 24. The contests today were under the auspices of the Vanderbilt cup commission, of which W. K. Vanderbilt is president. The first car to make the course was a small Buick, driven by Easter. It was followed closely by the machine driven by W. Olney. Easter covered the 23.46 miles in 30 minutes and 55 seconds, and Olney covered the course in 32 minutes and 55 seconds.

Ray Howard, driving a Palmer-Singer car in the Garden City sweepstakes, covered 23.46 miles in 23 minutes and 22 seconds.

### First Accident.

Sixteen cars were entered in the two-hundred-mile road race, which started at 7 o'clock this morning. The first accident reported was the upsetting of the Stoddard-Dayton car, driven by C. W. Wright, at Jericho. Neither Wright or his mechanic were seriously hurt.

In the big parkway sweepstakes, Herbert Lytle, in a large Isotta car, led the second round having covered 47 miles in 43 minutes and 42 seconds. Lewis Strang in a Renault followed in 46 minutes and 26 seconds, and Kirkpatrick in a Hitchkiss was third in 47 minutes and 19 seconds.

### Another Mishap.

The Palmer-Singer car was forced to drop out of the Garden City stakes on account of an accident at Plainview.

### Third Mishap.

The Stoddard-Dayton car, driven by Miller, went into the ditch at Plainview and Mechanic Lemonth was badly hurt. Miller narrowly escaped death, sustaining severe bruises. This is the second Stoddard-Dayton wreck today.

In the third lap of the Parkway sweepstakes, Lytle, Strang and Kirkpatrick were in the same order, having covered 71.1 miles in 65 minutes and 6 seconds; 69 minutes and 34 seconds and 70 minutes and 55 seconds. When this race was half over, Lytle had covered 117.3 miles in 107 minutes and 49 seconds.

The little Buick won the Nassau sweepstakes, covering 93.84 miles in 2 hours 7 minutes and 56 seconds. The Cameron car was second in 2 hours, 15 minutes and 53 seconds.
