UNITED GERMAN SOCIETIES

The first open meeting and entertainment under the auspices of the recently organized Consolidate Association of German-Speaking Societies of Oregon was held, at Arion hall last evening, and hundreds were unable to gain access to the auditorium because of the great crowd in attendance. The affair was a much greater success than the committee in charge of the arrangements had expected, and the next annual meeting will be held in a more spacious hall.

The organization has been perfected for the purpose of promoting closer social as well as business relations between its members. The success of last night's entertainment is a source of considerable gratification to the promoters of the alliance, and during the evening each of the speakers dwelt at length upon the attainment of the society's object as evidenced by the splendid gathering in attendance.

The evening's program was opened with a selection by Thielhorn's orchestra, after which Chairman Otto Kleemann introduced Governor Chamberlain, who delivered the opening address. The governor dwelt upon the success of the German people as a whole, and praised their enterprise and good citizenship, and at the conclusion of his speech was heartily applauded.

The Helvetia Sanger Corps then contributed several patriotic German airs which were encored enthusiastically, after which Rev. Charles T. H. Hopf delivered an address in German in which he complimented the different societies on the progress already made toward the cementing of closer relations with each other, and indorsed the plan to have the German language more generally taught throughout the country. The Arion Singing society then rendered an old German folk song which was

encored repeatedly. H. Schnoerr, president of the German society of Oregon City, and Joseph Jenny, of Mount Angel, were the next speakers.

The singing section of the Portland Social Turn Verein then contributed two selections which were well received, after which Otto Kleemann, chairman of the evening, delivered the closing address. The entire audience joined in the chorus of America, after which the gathering adjourned to allow the young people an opportunity to dance.
