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TWO HUNDRED MINERS BURN TO DEATH PARLIAMENT FORCED TO LISTEN TO DEMANDS OF UNEMPLOYED

CALAMITY CAUSED BY EXPLOSION

FLAMES STOP WORK OF RESCUE

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Vienna, Oct. 14.—Nearly two hundred men are entombed and probably have been burned to death today as the result of an explosion in the Koenigs coal mine in the province of Silesia.
There is no hope of saving the imprisoned men, as fire has cut off the work of rescue and there is indication that the disaster is one of the worst in the history of mining.
It is believed that practically all entombed miners are doomed to death.
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MIKADO STOPS "WAR OF WORDS"

WHEN AMERICANS ARRIVE

Tokio, Japan, Oct. 14.—The arrival of the Pacific coast business men at Japan's capital today was marked by the issuing of an imperial edict by the Mikado calling on the Japanese people to cultivate friendly relations with America and the western hemisphere and to cease the "war of words" which may result in the disrupting of international relations.
The edict promulgated today is one of the most remarkable that has ever been handed down from the Mikado.
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ATTEMPT RESCUE OF WOMEN

SUFFRAGETTES ARE DESPERATE

(United Press Leased Wire.)
London, Oct. 14.—Several hundred suffragettes, screaming and with hair and clothes disheveled after last night's rioting, made a concerted rush upon the police wagon, in which several of their members were being taken to jail and in the fight with the police that followed more than a dozen women were badly injured.
The suffragettes had stormed the courts several times during the arraignment of the prisoners and had made wild demonstrations outside the buildings. The leaders planned the grand culmination of the night and day of fighting, in the attempt to rescue the prisoners from the wagon.
The infuriated and half insane women upon the wagon in a body, they seized the heads of the horses and held them, while some actually climbed up on the wheels and into the seats, under blows from policemen's clubs.
The mounted police were hastily summoned to the aid of the wagon guards. The mounted men rode into the mob of women full tilt, scattering them, running down some and clubbing others and eventually putting them to flight. The wounded women shook their fists at the police and cried threats of vengeance as they were dragged away by their companions.
The scene within the courts where 37 women were arraigned as the result of the attack on parliament last night, was one of the most remarkable ever witnessed. All could have gone free if they would have promised not to take part in further demonstrations of the kind, but every one refused to make any such promise.
Fourteen were sentenced to jail to be confined from one to two months each. The other cases were postponed. All those sentenced accepted the punishment calmly. They were hailed as martyrs by their companions. All during the hearing the cries of the mob of women outside could be heard. The women beat upon the doors demanding entrance and now and then could be heard the crash of missiles thrown against a door or wall of the building.
The siege of parliament last night, in which no less than 100,000 persons participated was the most successful demonstration yet made by the suffragettes and the leaders today, in spite of their fatigue, are elated. The entire police force has been on duty now for 36 hours and they are the loudest in complaint against the women agitators.
Facing a repetition of the rioting of last night by the suffragettes will result in the death of many women and probably force the resignation of cabinet members the cabinet today is seriously considering the demands of the women leaders.
The suffragettes declare that they will persist in such demonstrations as the outbreak last night until their demands are heard.
The police are anxious for the cabinet to grant concessions to the women, as they say the rioting last night was by far the worst that has yet taken place. In all seven police-

WAR ONLY MATTER OF TIME

BULGARIA WATCHING TURKEY

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Constantinople, Oct. 14.—Reports from Salonica and Monastir today have convinced the Porte that Bulgaria is fomenting disorders in Macedonia to furnish an excuse for annexing that country to the "New Bulgarian Independence."
Bulgarian officers re organizing bands in both places, according to reports received and are supplying them with arms and bombs. Agents of Bulgaria are in all the provincial monasteries aiming to work up a sentiment for annexation to Bulgaria.
Turkey is convinced that Czar Ferdinand has delayed his declaration of war against Turkey for a few days in the hope that Turkey will take the initiative. If Turkey declines it is felt here to be certain that Ferdinand will declare war very soon.
The news had been received here that England has fallen in with Russia's proposal and advised Turkey to accept the independence of Bulgaria and the annexation of Herzegovina and Bosnia to Austria-Hungary as accomplished facts, and demand a pecuniary compensation.
The floating of a Turkish loan in Europe is regarded as acceptable to the Young Turk party here which is said to be secretly favorable to the recognition of Bulgaria's independence. A loan would put the new regime firmly in the saddle and avoid a war that is not popular with the people.
It is reported here today that Serbia and Montenegro have been advised by Russia that the Czar will safeguard their interests in the forthcoming conference of the powers and this is thought to have had a quieting effect on the sovereigns who were anxious to go to war with Austria.

TRAINS COLLIDE IN UTAH

ENGINEERS KILLED INSTANTLY

Salt Lake, Utah, Oct. 14.—Two men were killed and several injured in a freight wreck at Jordan Narrows on the Denver and Rio Grande early today.
The trains collided head on at a dangerous curve on the road. Neither engineer knew of the approach of the other train until it was too late to prevent the collision. T. J. Loftus and W. McAler, engineers, were killed instantly, and Fireman R. Thomas was badly injured. Several of the crew of both trains were injured by jumping.
The main line of the Denver and Rio Grande is tied up and all trains are being diverted over the Salt Lake route at Provo.

CANDIDATE IN SECOND ACCIDENT

TAFT TRAIN AGAIN OFF TRACK

Steubenville, Ohio, Oct. 14.—The Taft special was wrecked again today. Two wheels of the under second engine left the track when the train was going from Cadiz Junction to Cadiz, Ohio, this afternoon. No one was injured.
The train was going about ten miles an hour and was stopped before the injured engine had gone very far on the ties. The train was delayed about an hour for repairs.
The officials of the railroad company have started an investigation. It is probable that the best engines available will be ordered to the Taft special at once.

UNABLE TO TRACE \$40,000,000 PAID FOR PANAMA CANAL

New York, Oct. 14.—The New York World today prints a cable message from Paris, in connection with its efforts to learn definitely who got the forty million dollars paid by the government for the Panama canal, in which it is alleged that every source of information has been obliterated.
The Paris message asserts that all record of the identity of the persons who received the cash has been hidden and that the records of the details of the agreement between the United States and the Panama canal company have been destroyed.
The New York World is supporting Bryan in the present presidential campaign and the investigation by the World was based upon an alleged rumor that Douglas Robinson, brother-in-law of President Roosevelt, and Charles P. Taft, brother of the Republican presidential candidate, made large profits in dealing in Panama securities.
The World says that the liquidation of the French capital securities, supposed to have been sold to an American syndicate, was concluded on June 3, after four years of negotiations. It asserts that all official records for the transactions have been removed.
The sale of the canal to the United States was made by William Nelson Cromwell, who is prominent in the Republican campaign.

GENERAL MILES DISCREDITS WAR RUMORS

Baltimore, Md., Oct. 14.—General Nelson A. Miles, retired, today declared that there would be no war in Europe. None of the European nations wish a conflict, said General Miles, and the powers are opposed to war.
General Miles also declared that he thinks there is no possibility of war between the United States and Japan. He said that he does not see any possibility of war between America and any other nation.

HEAVY DAMAGE SUITS AGAINST NORTHERN PACIFIC

Billings, Mont., Oct. 14.—Damage suits aggregating \$1,000,000 are expected to be started against the Northern Pacific railroad as the result of the recent wreck at Young's Siding in which 21 persons were killed. The first suit has been filed here by Mrs. Mattie Anderson and her daughter Mabel, who ask for \$50,375 for the death of Robert Anderson, husband and father respectively, who was killed in the wreck. The coroner's jury held the crew of the freight train, which was struck by a passenger train, responsible for the collision.

ELOPED AND TOOK MONEY OF BRIDE'S FATHER

Oakland, Cal., Oct. 14.—Chester Scott, who eloped with Myrtle Welsh from Kennett, Shasta county, Monday is in the county jail today awaiting return to northern California.
Scott is charged by the girl's uncle, George Graus, with stealing \$637.80. That amount was found on the youth when police searched him last night. There is no charge against Miss Welsh, who is being held pending instructions from Kennett.
When the money was discovered upon Scott, the girl confessed that she had taken a bag of gold from her uncle's house on the night of their flight and gave it to Scott. Both declared that they did not count the money. Scott at first maintained that the money was his own but later admitted that it was not.
Constable Hostler, who brought the warrant, said that Graus became frenzied when he discovered that the money was missing.

ANOTHER BALLOON FALLS IN NORTH SEA

Berlin, Oct. 14.—A report from Heligoland says that the Castilla, one of the balloons contesting for the Bennett trophy, fell in the North Sea today and the occupants were rescued by patrol boat after a hard struggle. The patrol boat had been sent out to look for possible balloon accidents. It is said the men were nearly drowned when they were dragged aboard the boat.

ATTORNEY ATTACKED BY STRANGE WOMAN

San Jose, Cal., Oct. 14.—The local police today asked the San Francisco authorities to aid them in finding the beautiful woman who attacked Victor A. Scheel, a lawyer and politician of this city last night. The assailant of Scheel is described as a striking brunette and the police have learned that she is a resident of San Francisco.
Scheel was in his office when the mysterious woman entered. Shortly afterward Scheel summoned a surgeon to attend a knife cut that extended from his forehead to his chin and that required 20 stitches to close.
