### O. R. & N. BUILDING INTO ENTERPRISE

An Enterprise, Wallowa comes special to the La Grande Star of October 9, says:  
The end of the track is now in the Woods' place about four miles from Enterprise. There are no bridges to be completed, but the work is not supposed to stand in the way very long, and there is assurance from the railroad officials that the track will reach the county by the 15th of the month. The remains to be laid at the yards at Wallowa ten miles of track to complete the extension to Joseph. Of this amount three miles of track are in the yards at Wallowa and will be forwarded to the front as rapidly as needed. All the grading is finished to the end of the line with the exception of a couple of small cuts which will be finished within three days. From present indications the Wallowa extension will be completed to Joseph very close to the first of November.

### ABLE SPEAKERS TO ADDRESS SUFFRAGISTS

Buffalo, N. Y., Oct. 15.—Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the International Woman Suffrage alliance, has unexpectedly returned to the United States and will be one of the speakers at the fortieth annual convention of the National American Woman Suffrage association which will begin its sessions in Buffalo, N. Y., today.

It is not often that a convention of any character can present so many able speakers as the suffragists are promising for the meeting in question. They have been fortunate in securing Mrs. Phillip Snowden, of London wife of a popular member of parliament. Mrs. Snowden is said to be one of the most beautiful women in London, and Dr. Aked, pastor of Rockefeller's church, declares her to be "the greatest woman speaker since Frances Willard," though she is still in her twenties.

A Sunday afternoon mass meeting in the interest of industrial workers will be in charge of Mrs. Florence Kelley, secretary of the National Consumers' league, while the session devoted to social prophylaxis will be conducted by Dr. Prince Morrow, of New York, an expert in this line. One evening will be known as college night and the program for this has been arranged by President M. Carey Thomas, of Bryn Mawr.

One session will be devoted to a consideration of the original demands of the first Woman's Rights convention, which was held in Seneca Falls, N. Y., in 1848, and on this occasion Harriot Stanton Blatch will give the principal address, speaking to the revolution offered by her mother, Elizabeth Cady Stanton.

Miss Maud Miner, probation officer in the magistrature courts of New York city; Miss Harriet E. Grim of Illinois, who won the Elmina E. Springer prize of \$100 for the best woman suffrage oration in a collegiate contest; Rev. Anna Garlin Spencer, the noted philanthropist; Miss Jean M. Gordon, factory inspector of Louisiana; Rev. Anna Howard Shaw, considered by many persons to be among the women who will participate in the various discussions.

Stephens S. Wise, pastor of the most influential Jewish congregation in New York city, and Charles Edward Russell, the celebrated magazine writer, will deliver addresses.

Hotel headquarters will be at the Lenox. A trip to Niagara Falls and one or two receptions will furnish social features.

### HOUSE CATS GET WILD AROUND COOS BAY

The woods in the section around Coos Bay are rapidly filling with house cats that are becoming almost as wild and dangerous as the wild cat according to Deputy Game Warden Cal. Wright. He says that the cats are killing hundreds of birds, song and game birds, and are a menace to things in general.

Mr. Wright and Wm. Doyle just returned from a trip to Smith's basin and came across large numbers of the new pest of the woods. Mr. Wright is unable to account for the source of the new trouble unless it is that the house cats are breeding and increasing in numbers more rapidly than is the demand for them as pets. In consequence of not being given attention and food around the homes, they are going to the timber where in the course of a few months they become wild. If the new pest continues to increase in numbers, it is not unlikely that the county will have to place a bounty on them.

### WOODBURN PIONEER OF 1839 BUITED

Woodburn, Or., Oct. 13.—The funeral of John McKay, who died suddenly Saturday night, was held from St. Luke's church yesterday, and the funeral of his daughter, Mrs. Esther Delore, who died Monday took place today. John McKay was born at Fort Caldwell, Wash., December 10, 1839, his father John McKay, a Scotchman, being manager of the Hadson's Bay company at that point. McKay came with his parents to French prairie and lived near Gervais. He married Sophie Bisconelli and to them were born 14 children, six of whom are living: Mrs. Bernice of Oregon City, Moses McKay of St. Paul, Mrs. L. Cook of Portland and John and Wallace McKay of Woodburn, and George McKay of Portland.

Mrs. Mary Hershberger, whose maiden name was Laughlin, died here yesterday. She was born in Burtis, Leigh county, Tipperary, Ireland, in 1829, and came to America in the early 40s. She lived for awhile in Illinois, and in 1852 came to Oregon City with her brothers. In 1853 she married Thomas Fitzgerald, who died in 1860. In 1864 she married Jacob Hershberger. By her first marriage she had four children, three of whom are living: Judge Thomas Fitzgerald of Pendleton; Dr. P. H. Fitzgerald of Gervais and Mrs. N. S. Scollard of Woodburn. There was one child by the second marriage, Miss Mary Hershberger.

### HAD TO FIGHT MOTHER BEAR

Henry Carson, who resides in the Spencer Creek neighborhood, southwest of Eugene, killed three bears Monday morning in an orchard near Thos. Szakal's farm which lies on the west side of Spencer's butte and about six miles from Eugene.

The man who was attending the orchard had been complaining for some time that some person had been stealing his apples. Mr. Carson, knowing the habits of bears and hearing that several had been seen in that vicinity, took his gun and dog this morning and made a trip to the orchard, thinking perhaps it was a bear instead of a man that had been stealing the fruit. His suspicions were confirmed when, upon his arrival in the orchard he came upon a big female bear and two cubs perhaps six months old. He opened fire, and killed the two cubs, whereupon the mother showed fight and charged upon Mr. Carson. He held his ground and finished the bear but not before she had advanced to within a yard of the gun barrel.
