NEW SCHEDULES FOR STREETCAR LINES

Inspector Joe Zinn, of the Portland general street railway here, has now completed the schedule on all lines. The new time is much faster than that heretofore, and Mr. Zinn deserves great credit for the manner in which he has improved the passenger service while in his lately appointed capacity. The schedule is as follows:

Chemeketa line, every 15 minutes; 10, 25, 40, 55 past even hour. State street, every 20 minutes; 5, 25, 45 minutes past the even hour. Yew Park and depot, every 12 minutes; 5, 17, 29, 41, 53 minutes past the even hour.

Fair grounds, every 15 minutes; 22 1/2, 37 1/2, 52 1/2 minutes past the even hour.

South Salem, every 15 minutes; 15, 30, 45 minutes past the even hour.

Garden Road, every 15 minutes; 15, 30, 45 minutes past the even hour.

All cars leave from State and Commercial streets.

COUNTRY AT DOOR OF GREAT BUSINESS ERA

Business Men Say That the Activity in Building Trades, the Issue of Bonds by Railroads and Industry, the Bountiful Crops and the Development of Mineral Resources Mean Record-Breaking Years in Output of the Nation's Wealth.

New York, Oct. 16—Business men who have been observing keenly the economic developments of the last few months, said today that the country one year after the financial stringency in Wall street, was entering upon an era that would eclipse the prosperity of the administrations of McKinley and Roosevelt. A few striking facts drove them to that prediction. Despite the panic of last fall practically one-half a billion dollars of securities had been sold by railroads, industrial and manufacturing concerns, and the proceeds were being devoted to enlargements of plants and the building of more factories and railroads. In September the total building expenditure throughout the country was more than \$41,000,000, which exceeded the expenditures of September of a year ago by \$4,000,000. The harvesting of crops, valued at almost seven billion dollars, and the wages paid to contractors and laborers meant the pouring of millions of dollars of savings into banks throughout the country. Furthermore, manufacturers were preparing for a large output. A report of the department of commerce and labor showed that the imports for August exceeded those of any previous month this year, and were greater than those of the preceding August. All these things showed, experts said, that the manufacturing, mining and other interests were lining up for a year that promised to increase the wealth of the nation enormously.

Business men said that they could see no other trend to the development of the resources of the country than the continued administration which had made possible in the last 12 years the tremendous increase of the nation's wealth. That after the panic which had shaken the confidence of bank depositors and of business men who must necessarily transact much business on credit, factories, merchants and workmen should have had such assurance about the future was considered as a tribute to the Republican administration.

A cursory review of the matter in which financiers, manufacturers and business men generally pulled the country through the panic of 1907 and plunged anew into plans for the creation of more wealth and a continuance of the prosperity of the country under a Republican administration shows that the last year has been a remarkable one. The Union Pacific railroad early in the year issued \$50,000,000 in bonds to be devoted to the extension of its lines and the making of improvements. The Pennsylvania railroad issued \$40,000,000 in bonds to continue its improvements. The New York Central railroad got \$30,000,000 to put into improvements. The Central Pacific sold \$18,000,000 worth of bonds and utilized the money in a way that gave work to many men. There was the Tidewater company, with an issue of \$17,000,000; the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy with \$15,000,000, and many other roads. Gas companies, electric light, traction, industrial and other companies issued bonds for improvements amounting in all to half a billion dollars. New companies, with capital amounting to many million dollars, also were formed.

In July the effect of that outlay of new capital became apparent. The building trades began to show improvement, and by September the amount expended in such work exceeded that of any month in the year and that of the preceding September. Reports to Bradstreet's from 67 cities showed that in them \$41,000,000 had been spent in one month in building operations. That report did not include money spent in extensions of railroads and new equipment or improvements. Already, railroads are discussing the project of spending \$600,000,000 a year in the extension of railroads. President Taft estimated recently that as 45,000 miles had been added to the total mileage in ten years an additional 55,000 in the next ten years would not meet the increasing demands of the country.

With the financial stringency of last October it was apparent that there had been an overproduction, but the retrenchment of several months and the reviving of building operations and the promotion of new projects began in July to convince manufacturers that there would be a new demand within a short time. They began to prepare for it. The articles, imported for use in factories in August, exceeded those of 1907. That fact is shown by a report of the department of labor and commerce.
