JOHN BURNS AND HIS ELECTRIC TRAMCAR

Shortly after his marriage, which took place in 1880, John Burns, the British labor leader, settled down as a journeyman engineer in Batterssea, and not long ago confessed that he was the first engineer to make with his own hands the first electric tramcar in this country.

In those days, however, people did not believe that electric traction was possible, and Burns had to take the dynamo and tram to the Crystal Palace and run the latter round the grounds for six months before people could be induced to believe in the novelty.

But the people were so nervous that, although the charge was only sixpence, none of them would venture in the new-fangled invention. Then Burns was struck with a brilliant idea. He said to his wife:

"You have got to come down to the palace three times a week and get into the first electric tramcar as a decoy duck for the others."

This was only temporarily successful. So Burns brought along his mother-in-law, "and," said the president of the local government board when relating the incident, "when a husband, a wife and a mother-in-law co-operate success is assured."—Tit-Bits.

PSYCHOLOGIST TO LECTURE AT Y. M. C. A.

UNCLE SAM'S PENSIONERS

The preliminary report of the commissioner of pensions says the total numbers of pensioners on the rolls on June 30th last was 951,687.

During the year 54,366 were dropped from the rolls and 38,682 added, making a net loss of 15,684. Of those dropped from the rolls 34,333 were survivors of the Civil war. There are now 628,084 survivors of the last named war on the rolls. The

number of deaths of Civil war survivors was 3132 greater than the previous year.

Commissioner Warner's report shows that 188,445 widows of soldiers already have taken advantage of the law passed by the last session of congress increasing to \$10 a month the pensions to widows. The actual expenditure for the year on account of pensions, according to report, was \$153,993,986, but on account of legislation increasing the rate to individual pensioners the annual value of the roll at the close of the year was \$159,496,701, an increase of \$18,644,821 over the previous year. This expenditure is the largest in the history of the bureau.
