**The Resolutions.** Following is the report of the committee on resolutions adopted by the citizens of the Seventh ward:

The citizens of the Seventh ward meeting assembled wish to praise the efficient labors of Aldermen Elliott and Radcliff in getting before the city council the immediate necessity for a safe bridge across creek on South Commercial street.

"We unanimously demand that the structure be full width of the street and protest against any bridge so narrow that street in any manner."

"We believe it is due the people of the Seventh ward who have received a very small part of the \$43,000 of direct taxes levied upon the property of the city in expenditures their ward that a first-class bridge be constructed on the main street leading to South Salem."

"We demand a more just system of expenditure under which a larger share of the taxes paid on the property of this ward shall be expended for the improvement of the ward."

... der the circumstances, of controlling the rioting element of the people of these smaller states, who have set their hearts on war.

Belgrade, Servia, Oct. 17.—A mob of Servians attempted to lynch the local correspondent of a Vienna newspaper today and attacked a number of other Austrian residents.

The city is in a turmoil. Nearly all the Austrian residents of the town have taken refuge in the embassy of Austria-Hungary and the others have armed themselves and barricaded their homes, prepared to resist attacks.

Clashes are reported in many parts of the city by the police, who are either powerless to prevent disorder or are making no attempt to prevent the outrages against the Austrians.

When the police rescued the Viennan correspondent today, he was nearly dead and it is not thought that he can live long.

The Servian people seem to be determined to force Austria into a declaration of war, since King Peter has refused to declare war.

## RAINS ARE HELPING

### RIVER NAVIGATION

The rainfall which has been prevailing in this vicinity has proven valuable assistance to the river traffic, and the O. C. T. Co.'s boats running between here and Portland are arriving at this point in much better time than they did two weeks ago. The Willamette river now stands just five feet and owing to the rain on the upper river around Albany and Eugene being heavier and of longer duration than has been around this city, the rise will continue for some time yet. The heaviest traffic of the season is now coming on for the boats in the way of hops and potatoes. These late products are shipped in great quantities from the upper country along the river but the transportation company is unable to make these trips, to carry the output of the fertile farms in the vicinity of Independence, Sidney and Buena Vista, owing to the extreme low water. The result is, that by the time the river

will be sufficiently high for the boats to operate, the stock of shipments will have accumulated to such an extent that the steamers will be forced to carry their utmost capacity.
