COUNTERFEITERS' PLANT OPERATED ON SCOW
(United Press Leased Wire.)

Sacramento, Cal., Oct. 19.—Edward Hinman and J. E. Stephens, who were arrested several days ago at Marysville for passing spurious bills, were identified today as the men who leased a scow on the river front not more than a hundred yards from the city prison, on which was found a complete outfit for making counterfeit money. The police started an investigation after the men were arrested and found out that two men had leased a scow on the river front and operated there at making counterfeit money. The men had a man with them and went out to various small towns near here to buy the coin, according to the woman.

Today the owner of the scow identified Hinman and Stephens as the men who had leased the boat and the men will be taken to Stockton for a hearing before the federal commissioner.

MARTIN WOULD CURE DRUG HABIT IN PRISON
(United Press Leased Wire.)

Portland, Oct. 19.—Believing that a man in prison will afford him an opportunity to be cured of the craving for morphine, Edward Martin, post point and college graduate and lieutenant in the United States army, convicted Saturday of the murder of Nathan Wolf in his pawnshop last summer, announced today that he would abide by the verdict of manslaughter unless the sentence is heavy. "Of course I did not kill Wolf," said the prisoner today, "and the verdict was a great shock to me, as an innocent man I am willing to serve time in the penitentiary in the hope that such confinement may cure me of the morphine habit." Martin added that it is probable that if the maximum penalty of 15 years is imposed he may accept it without an appeal.

TAFT PUTTING IN SOME HARD LICKS

Newark, N. J., Oct. 19.—Judge William Howard Taft, Republican candidate for the presidency, began

a strenuous campaign tour today, at the beginning of the last week but one before the election next month. He will make a tour of this state, then invade Delaware, Indiana and Ohio, in an effort to make sure of the states that are now considered in the "doubtful" column. Taft opened his New Jersey campaign today at Blaney after a conference at the home of Governor Murphy, between Murphy, Taft and Chairman Hitchcock of the Republican national committee. The three leaders had breakfast together and discussed the situation in New Jersey. Taft is to speak at Rahwy, Elizabeth, New Brunswick and Trenton today and will then invade Delaware. Tonight he will speak at Baltimore. In Indiana, Taft is scheduled to speak at Evansville, Indianapolis and Fort Wayne.

EXPLOSION KILLS AND MAIMS WORKMEN

Springfield, Mass., Oct. 19.—Two workmen were fatally injured and ten seriously hurt in an explosion in the mixing room of the Fiberoid company near here today. The force of the explosion completely wrecked the interior of the plant. Most of the victims are being removed to the hospitals in this city. Supplies are being rushed to the stricken fire districts in Michigan. While trying to escape from his guards at Vancouver, Wash., Eugene M. Lyman, awaiting trial for desertion, was shot and killed.

RELIEF IN FIRE SWEEPED COUNTRY

CONFLAGRATION IS DYING OUT

(United Press Leased Wire.) Detroit, Mich., Oct. 19.—Shifting winds are bringing relief to fire-swept district in the upper and lower peninsulas today. The flames are being forced back over territory already charred and blackened and are burning themselves out in the devastated districts. Gangs of men, aided by the wind, are out from the coast towns fighting the smaller fires and endeavoring to save some of the lumber and timber from destruction. It is estimated roughly that the loss of lumber, buildings and standing timber will reach \$2,000,000.

The friends of organized labor cannot forget that Bryan is the man who proposed to cut wages in two with the fifty cent dollar.

Mr. Bryan says there is always hope for a man who changes. Yes, but not for a man who changes from bad to worse.

Governor Hughes made some punctures in the Bryan record in his Ohio speech that left the record more badly disfigured than ever, if that were possible.

The theory of a new Bryan is difficult to assimilate. He is the same old 1896 Bryan with some 1908 variations.

Mr. Bryan declares that he does not favor government ownership of railroads. He favored it as late as May, 1907, and has not yet recanted the statement he then made that he did not believe anything could be accomplished by attempts to regulate the railroads and that government ownership of them was inevitable.

The best one can wish for the Denver physician who inoculated himself with ten kinds of disease germs is that none of them will take any better than Mr. Bryan's attempt to inoculate the people with his fifty-seven varieties of issues.

Judge Parker is such a cheerful looking man that it is hard to believe that he is the deep dyed Jeremiah that his lamentations at the Saratoga convention would indicate.

Mr. Taft has found no "enemy's country" in his tour of the glad and prosperous west.

Labor is learning that its only safety is in precise, exact equality before the law with capital. Mr. Taft assures labor of such standing. Mr. Bryan makes labor the demagogic promise of special privilege which labor does not want and knows it cannot get.

Mr. Taft has always completed every public task set before him in a most satisfactory manner. Mr. Bryan starts on one task only to abandon it for something new that may catch his fancy. The American people like a man who stays put.

At Lincoln, Neb., July 3, 1908, Herman Ridder of New York, the new treasurer of the Democratic national committee, gave out an interview in which he said: "I said to Mr. Bryan: 'You cannot carry New York, and you cannot be elected. Why don't you step aside and permit the nomination of some man who can be elected?' Mr. Ridder's judgment was exceptionally good at that time, and his statement of fact still holds true.

NEWS FROM HERE, THERE AND EVERYWHERE

At last the Italian royal household has recognized the engagement of Duke d'Abruzzi and Katherin Elkins.

Mr. Bryan having been conclusively proved to be a dreamer, it behoove every voter to see that he is prevented from indulging in any nightmares at the expense of the country.

"My views are well known," shout Mr. Bryan. Will the gentleman kindly give the vintage—1896, 1900 or 1908?
