ROCKY MOUNTAIN EXPRESS

COMING TO SALEM TUESDAY

"The Rocky Mountain Express" is bound to arrive on time at the Grand opera house on Tuesday evening as the red light will be hung out from above the station on that date; there is no chance of her being side-tracked or abandoned, as she will run on special orders and come in on the fast track. This should be the signal for a big turnout, as "The Rocky Mountain Express" will bring to town a theatrical company of decided merit, and a production of importance.

It is a play with a scenic display of exceptional beauty, with sensational effects beyond comparison, with a series of scenes both interesting and thrilling, with a company of players far above the ordinary, with newly throughout situations surprising and logical, with atmosphere as exhilarating as the mountain breezes. There is need to say but little of the story of "Checkers." The blending of a strong pure love or a refined girlhood with the rugged, strenuous activity of a manly young fellow of the ponies, involving the surrender of each a little to the other, but in such a manner as to win the plaudits of the friends of both, is regarded as a triumph of literary skill in book form, while the stage version may be said to be something "sure to make you sit up and listen."

The only changes from the book story as told in the play are said to be such as the rigid requirements of the stage demand and these changes have strengthened the story rather than weakened it. HISTORICAL SOCIETY GETS QUEER OLD GUN

One of the most prized articles which has come to the possession of the Oregon Historical society for some time is an old gun which Major Lee Moorhouse gave to Secretary George H. Himes while he was here on his recent visit.

This old gun was presented to Major Moorhouse by Louis Chalfoe, a mixed blood Indian who has been living on the reservation, but who has recently left for Idaho. Not wishing to carry the old gun with him Chalfoe turned it over to Mr. Moorhouse.

The gun was brought from England in 1845 and was used by the volunteers in the Cayuse war in 1847. The man who brought it to this country was Rev. Father Riley, a Catholic priest of St. Paul in the Willamette valley. The gun has a double barrel, one barrel of which is used for shot and the other as a rifle.

The old shot pouch and powder horn and strap are whole but are badly worn. In one place the horn is worn almost through. Chalfoe said that he had used it almost 20 years.
