STANDARD OIL BUILDING WESTERN REFINERY

Oakland, Cal., Oct. 19.—Additional work on the large refining and storage plant of the Standard Oil Company began today. The eastern headquarters of the company has authorized the expenditure of more than a million dollars for the reclamation of Marshlands which the company owns.

The machinery of the plant will be augmented by the addition of ten or more units in the refinery and the erection of storehouses and sheds together with an extra pier.

The land in the vicinity of the refinery, at present submerged will be ultimately entirely reclaimed. The driving of the piling foundation will be the first work undertaken and the extension of the present buildings will follow.

Circuit Court Docket.

The case of Cutsforth vs. Benjamin by the circuit court for Thursday next at 9 p. m.

A suit for commission has been filed in the circuit court by Radcliff, realty agent, to recover commission alleged due for the sale of property formerly belonging to Margaret Bellea. It is claimed that Ellen L. Hazelton the purchaser of the property, paid \$210 in advance, but it was later discovered the title was defective which stopped the sale.

Suit has been filed in the circuit court demanding damages to the sum of \$4000 from the Portland Light & Power company, for injuries alleged to have been received at the intersection of State and High street on July, 1907. He claims \$80 for physician charges resulting from injuries about the body caused by the quick starting of the car which threw him from the running board, \$3000 for loss of work and \$1000 for many other alleged forms of injury.

A petition has been filed with probate court by J. B. Simpson asking that he be appointed administrator of the estate of Jella Ann Simpson, deceased. The estate is valued at \$1200, and the heirs is as follows: J. B. Simpson Jr., grandson; Sylvia Mertell, granddaughter, Bessie Simpson Smith, granddaughter; Lola Simpson, granddaughter and Victor Simpson, grandson.

ACKERMAN APPROVES OF COUNTY HIGH SCHOOLS

Superintendent Ackerman was interviewed today, relative to the advisability of the people of a county voting for the establishing of a county high school fund, from which the tuition of all high school pupils in the county, shall be paid in accordance with certain regulations, and he gives it as his opinion, that any scheme, by which high schools in any part of the county shall be placed upon the same footing, both as to accessibility and the equalizing of the expense of such schools, meets with his hearty approval. He is also of the opinion that all of the property of the county should be taxed, for the support of all the high schools in the county, no matter where they may be situated. Any movement, that will bring high school instruction closer to the pupils, no matter where they may reside is praiseworthy. By bringing the high school closer to the home, it will not only encourage higher education, but also enable pupils in rural communities to have high school facilities, and still be at home every night where they should be. Not only that, but in rural communities they will have the opportunity to assist in farm work, mornings, evenings and Saturdays, which in itself is no small factor in their education. Taking it all in all he is in accord with the movement and sincerely trusts that the people of Marion county will give the matter their most careful attention.

NEW SCHOOL SITE BOUGHT FOR SALEM

Action was taken by the school board at the meeting Saturday evening toward a new school building, and a site has been located. The piece of property on which the board has decided, is the Tuttle place corner of Cottage and Marion streets. The price to be paid for the site is \$4750. This purchase was authorized by a vote of the people last June. Directors Eopley and Babcock proved to be a majority of the committee, but Director Moores filed a minority report suggesting bids for several properties be advertised, but Babcock and Eopley were of the opinion such a move would tend to boost property values out of sight. It is believed that with the new site about \$700 will be saved and eventual selling of a house standing on the property.

People Versus Freight. Journal: People must wait on freight. A year full of Salem people has to sit on the track awaiting the coming of the freight cars. Per carload of hogs or a carload of blocks the way and Salem must patiently wait. When the freight is done the passengers proceed. Human beings must wait a back seat for freight. This is the practice on the South Pacific and the Oregon Electric. It is not right. The freight trains are harder to handle but they do not have right of way over hogs. When a long string of cars is being switched on the rail passenger traffic is blocked out on a whole system. The schedule is disarranged. Perhaps fifty or a hundred people time while a carload of hogs is set out or into the station. The right of way should be passed to streetcars the right of way, and all freight to keep out of the way of regularly moving cars carrying passengers.
