## SHOW CONGRESS WHY OPEN RIVER MUST COME

W. B. F. JONES URGES DEVELOPMENT LEAGUES TO PREPARE INFORMATION SHOWING OREGON CITY BARRIER IS INJURING WILLAMETTE VALLEY.

Urging the open Willamette river as an agency for increasing the prosperity of all western Oregon, and increasing the manifest inactivity in behalf of that important enterprise, W. B. F. Jones, representative from Polk and Lincoln counties and father of the law by which the state of Oregon proposes to bear all the expense of acquiring the Oregon City locks and throwing the river open to free navigation, spent yesterday in Portland, and devoted most of his time in the interest of the enterprise in which he has been so important a factor. During the day he was in conference with Senator Bourne, with whom the chances of securing the operation of congress in providing for governmental control of the locks were discussed. The need for additional information with reference to the amount of traffic along the river was emphasized by Senator Bourne, and it is the purpose of

Mr. Jones to urge the Western Oregon Development league, the Open Willamette association and commercial bodies to collect such information and place it in the hands of the Oregon delegation for use at the coming session of congress. **Whole Valley, Should Act.** "The people of the Willamette valley as far south as Eugene should rise to an appreciation of the importance of activity from now on until congress meets," said Mr. Jones. "It is scarcely more than six weeks until the session convenes, and beyond the passage of a law by the legislature and such effort as The Journal has put forth, but little has been done in behalf of the Willamette project, a measure that is without question a paramount issue among the people of the Willamette region. "A rivers and harbors bill will be passed at the coming session, and if the Willamette fails to secure recognition in it, the last chance for federal aid for a period of three years will be gone. The state will then have to make provision to bear the entire expense of acquiring the locks or the private corporation that now monopolizes this natural highway will continue to collect its toll upon the labor and industry of the Willamette region. For 30 years there has been no reduction of rates on the river, and the traffic once so heavy upon it has almost entirely disappeared. Twenty odd years ago, I conducted a woodyard on the river at Centennial slough south of Corvallis, and the steamboats of that day were my customers. There was a daily service then, where now the sound of a steamboat whistle would be a strange, unearthly sound and frighten the people of the vicinity. "This disappearance of the river traffic, due to a closed river at Oregon City which in turn prevents the opening of a deep channel to Corvallis and Eugene, has been a costly experience for every resident of the Willamette valley. Every product of every kind shipped out, and every article of every kind shipped in, has paid an unnatural toll to an unnatural barrier at Oregon City, and every cent of the cost, aggregating millions of dollars, has come out of the pockets of farmers, workmen, merchants and every other activity of life. Until this river is made open and free, the peerless Willamette valley will never come into its own, and that should be the reason for everybody from Portland to beyond Eugene to join in a campaign that would have 'success' for its shibboleth, and know no such word as fail."

### WANTS MONOPOLY ON MEDFORD LIQUOR SUPPLY

Councilman W. T. Vaughn of Portland submitted to the city council last evening an amended ordinance granting a franchise to the Gothenburg association to sell liquor in Medford for a period of ten years. The ordinance differs from the one published in Thursday's Tribune so far as it provides for the suggestion of councilmen at the afternoon session. The ordinance as amended provided as follows regarding a monopoly in the city: Section 1. That from and after the first day of October, 1909, the Medford Gothenburg association is hereby granted the right within the corporate limits of the city of Medford, Oregon, to sell and otherwise dispose of alcoholic, vinous, malt or sprituous liquors, drinks and beverages from the first day of October, 1909, and no other person, firm or corporation shall at any time be granted a license or privilege to sell such alcoholic, vinous, malt or sprituous liquors within said corporate limits during any part of said term of the whole thereof, except the application of such other person, firm or corporation be first approved by a majority vote of the qualified electors of said city at an election held for that purpose; and provided further, that no such other license shall be granted for a shorter period than ten years, nor for less license fees than those hereinafter specified to be paid by said Medford Gothenburg association.

The amended ordinance provided districts in the city as follows: On De Anza street between Sixth and Eighth streets, and on Fir street between Seventh and Eighth streets, except that this territorial restriction shall not apply to any bona fide hotel hereafter constructed containing 75 rooms or more. The third change made was one providing for an inspection of liquor in stock by a duly authorized inspector: Section 1\*. The said city shall at all times have the right to employ an inspector for the purpose of inspecting all liquors and stock on hand belonging to said Medford Gothenburg association, which liquors and stock on hand shall at all times be open to said inspector for such inspection, and in the event that said inspector find any of such liquors or stock on hand impure or unfit for consumption, said city may forthwith confiscate and destroy such of said liquors or stock on hand as may be so found impure or unfit for consumption. The council indulged in much discussion of the ordinance, finally referring it to a committee composed of Eifert, Merriek and Otwell.
