doorall to Timmons' room, and that which still continued to ooze from the man's throat. Westcott, who was standing behind Mrs. Hayball when she opened the door, took in the situation, and rushed to the room of the couple to see what could be done. It was plain to be seen at a glance that Mrs. Timmons was beyond human aid, lying in a pool of blood on the floor, with one foot still elevated to the bed, from which she, apparently, sprang as she received the death-dealing slash. The man had climbed back into the bed and was once again in a stupor. Westcott, after setting his son, Harry, at the door of the house, hurried to a nearby telephone and notified Chief of Police Gibson, at the city hall. Gibson went immediately to the scene of the crime, and, in turn, notified Dr. W. B. Morse and Coroner Clough. Dr. Morse stated that he believed the man would survive. The cut in the woman's throat was several inches in length on the left side, and was inflicted with such strength that it severed the wind-pipe and went far into the back part of the neck.

The couple had lived at the Westcott home for the last five weeks, and Timmons had been drunk the greater part of that time, according to Mrs. Hayball, who says she had ordered him to leave the house on several occasions, and was doing her utmost to make them leave. A short time ago, Mrs. Hayball states, Timmons came home late at night and used such blasphemous language to his wife and in such a threatening manner that she, in fear, sent a hurry-call for Policeman Welch. The arrival of the officer on that occasion seemed to have a quieting effect upon Timmons, as no more noise was heard during the night. But the next morning Mrs. Timmons told Mrs. Hayball how she had spent a sleepless night in terrible dread, her husband waving his razor over her head and threatening her every moment.

The dead woman, who is young and pretty, with light golden hair, came to this city with her husband-slayer a short time before they took the room in the Westcott house. Just previous to this she lived in Portland, it is believed, at 147 Tibbitts street. She is an orphan, but has an unmarried sister, Edna B. Bogart, and an uncle, Mr. Bogart, at Eugene. The uncle is a farmer, and is said to be quite well known. The murdered woman lived some time in Eugene and Oswego. From there it is believed she went to Toledo, Washington, where she met and married Timmons, after which the couple came to Portland. Timmons is a plasterer, 37 years of age, who comes from Lexington, Nebraska, and is a brother of Abe Timmons, also a plasterer, who lived in this city a number of years ago, and is now said to be a well-to-do workman in Portland.

Timmons, when sober, apparently realized that it was useless to try to longer remain with his wife, and perhaps knew of his murderous inclination when drunk, and yesterday afternoon the couple, at 5 o'clock, called at the office of Attorney W. E. Keyes and agreed to secure a divorce, stating that it was absolutely impossible for them to live together. Keyes was busy, and, after a short interview, told them to call again at 10 o'clock this morning. He stated that he believed Timmons was sober at the time, and that the couple started that it was impossible to live together any longer. It must have been after his call that Timmons again got under the influence of liquor, and, thinking of the fact that his wife was to leave him, became frenzied and enraged at her.

Among those who know what little is known of the couple since their residence in this city, it is said Timmons was "an angry jealous" of his wife and that, when under the influence of liquor, he was wont to abuse and threaten her to a terrible extent. Timmons, when questioned this morning, while unable to speak, nodded his head in affirmative, when asked if he had committed the crime.

Coroner Clough is making arrangements to hold an inquest over the remains tomorrow morning. Awaiting the outcome of his inquest, Timmons is held confined in the Salem hospital.

The remains of the unfortunate girl were taken to Coroner Clough's undertaking parlors.

R. D. HUME REPORTED IN WRECK

Marshfield, Or., Oct. 21.—R. D. Hume and party and two gasoline schooners are reported wrecked off Gold Beach, on the Curry county coast. Whether any lives have been lost cannot be ascertained at this hour, all telephone communication to the south being shut off. The last wire went down after a brief message of the disaster reached here last night.

The schooners Enterprise and Oxtrey left here for Rogue river Sunday morning, the Enterprise being in tow of the Oxtrey, because there was only one captain for the two vessels.

A heavy storm was encountered Monday morning and the vessels were driven ashore in the gale. The Enterprise, valued at \$10,000, is said to be a total loss. The Oxtrey may be saved. It is reported. It is valued at \$8000.

BRYAN MAKES MORE PROMISES TO LABOR

Marshfield, Or., Oct. 21.—In his address here today Bryan promised that if he is elected president he will have a representative of labor in his cabinet, and seek to have the anti-trust law amended, preventing its application to labor unions.

He declared that he would urge upon congress to pass a law guaranteeing jury trials in labor injunctions and contempt proceedings.

In closing, Bryan declared that he was not nominated with the aid of the President had no corporation to threaten its employees with discharge if they did not favor his election, and has no rich relative to contribute money for the circulation of eulogies.

TERRIBLE FIRE IN A TENEMENT

THREE CONSUMED BY BLAZE

(United Press Special Wire)
New York, Oct. 21.—The third East Side tenement fire in two weeks was discovered early this morning. The flames burned three persons to death before the firemen could reach the house where seriously injured. The panic that followed the arrival of the engines, and were rescued by the fire.

Scarcely had the last person been taken from the blazing building when the police before the central fire station were investigating the circumstances leading to the fire. Most of the occupants of the tenement were asleep at the time the flames were first discovered. The fire had its origin in the rear of the building in the basement. It spread upward through the water shaft and obtained a start on every floor.

The inmates became panic stricken and ran poorly clad into the street. The passways became packed with fighting humanity, and the police firemen had to fight their way through to reach the upper floors.

Frightened women and children clambered out on the iron fire escape where policemen reached them before they jumped to the pavement. Others reached the scullery-holes and were helped to safety over the sides of neighboring houses.

The bodies of the victims were drenched by the firemen after the fire was extinguished.

The tenement was located at East Third street. The dead have been identified as follows:
