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CRACKSMEN ROB BANK OF \$4,700 STRONG VAULT IS DYNAMITED

Sioux Falls, S. D., Oct. 22.—The vaults of the State Bank of Vergil were looted today by cracksmen who dynamited the huge steel doors, after breaking their way into the building. The burglars took with them \$4700 and valuable papers. The work of the safe-crackers was clean-cut, showing that skilled operators had worked on the "job." HAVE BEEN AT WAR FOR TEN DAYS PROVINCES REFUSE TO SUBMIT

London, Oct. 22.—Open warfare has been in progress in Bosnia and Herzegovine for ten days, and scores have been killed, according to information brought here today by the Montenegro agent. More than 120,000 Austrian troops have been attacked by insurrectionists in the annexed territories, and the fighting has been continuous. So far as is known no pitched battle has taken place, as the insurrectionists are greatly outnumbered by the Austrians, but their guerrilla tactics have been very effective. The situation is so serious that the Austrian government has rushed reinforcements to the aid of the border troops. Through strict censorship, the agent said, the Austrian government has suppressed all reports of the situation, as it really is. Anarchy exists in the eastern and southern sections of the annexed territory. The Montenegrin agent came here

CZARINA IS BECOMING DEMENTED ADVISED TO LEAVE RUSSIA

St. Petersburg, via Eydtkuhnen, Oct. 22.—Unless the Czarina of all the Russias leaves immediately for a state voyage to the Mediterranean she will lose her mind, according to information conveyed today to the Emperor by her physicians. Reduced to a nervous wreck by terror of revolutionary violence, the Empress is suffering almost constantly from hallucinations. For days she refuses to utter a word, believing that she is a victim of vocal defect, making speech impossible. Again she thinks herself crippled and demands to be wheeled in an invalid chair. The Czarina steadfastly refuses to leave the country unless Nicholas or the young Czar accompanies her on the trip. This request is meeting with the objection of the Czar's advisers, who declare that, were either to leave the country, an attempt to overthrow the dynasty might result.

SLAYER RESTING EASILY WILL PROBABLY LIVE TO BE TRIED

C. Y. Timmons, who murdered his young wife and afterwards attempted suicide Tuesday night, is resting easily at the Salem hospital today. Notwithstanding his serious condition, the patient passed the night fairly well, the nurse administering stimulants only once, and his chances for recovery are very good, as stated by the doctors today. Timmons did not allude to his awful deed in his restless murmurs last night, nor did he appear to be suffering from remembrances, if any he had, of the crime he so fiendishly committed. Deputy Sheriff Wm. Esch has taken charge of the murderer, and had him placed in leg shackles and handcuffs this morning, as a precaution taken to prevent self-injury. A special nurse was also placed in charge of the sufferer, in order that he may have the best possible care until his condition is so that he can be removed to the county jail. All communication has been forbidden by the officials today with Timmons. A signed confession has been handed to District Attorney McNary by the attending physician, Dr. W. B. Morse, with two witnesses' signatures attached. The confession is as follows:

today to investigate closely the exact situation, with a view to learning what course England will pursue in the event that Serbia and Montenegro declare war on Austria. The agent declares that the action of Austria amounts to an attempt to terrorize Bosnia and Herzegovina into submission by force of arms. The temper of the people, he asserts, is such that they will never submit to annexation. The detention of Envoy Vukitch by the Austrian authorities at Agram Tuesday was merely a pretext to allow them to search his baggage, the agent declared. For this reason, he said, the apology offered by Austria was not accepted and Montenegro will insist upon the payment of an indemnity. This information, the most startling coming from a semi-official source since the trouble has been pending, caused a sensation in diplomatic circles here, and investigations have been started to determine the truth of the reports. The Montenegrin agent is positively convinced that war is certain to involve the Balkan states. He says that mountain fighting has been in progress in Bosnia and Herzegovina ever since the annexation was announced, and that it has been growing more serious day by day.

MURDERERS COVER COVER AND LEAVE VICTIM

Aberdeen, Wash., Oct. 22.—That he was killed by tramps, who were afraid to take his valuables after committing the crime, is the theory advanced by the police today in an effort to explain the death of John Matson, whose mutilated body was found in a shack outside the city limits. His skull was fractured, evidently by many blows. The murderers carefully covered the body with a blanket, but did not touch two watches and some change found in his clothes.

PREPARING TO RUN ROADS WITH ELECTRICITY

San Francisco, Oct. 22.—W. A. Worthington, assistant to the director of management and operation of the Harriman lines, is today conferring with officers of the Southern Pacific system regarding the proposed changes of the motive power to electricity in the Sierras, both to facilitate shipments and reduce the cost of hauling. Worthington will stay here four days. He has inspected the entire system from Chicago to San Francisco, visiting Portland and other northern cities.

POPE TO NAME AMERICAN BISHOPS

Rome, Oct. 22.—Catholics here are discussing today an announcement in the "Osservatore Romano," the Vatican organ, that the Congregation of the Propaganda, which has hitherto nominated the American bishops, has been dissolved and succeeded by the Consistorial Congregation, which is to be presided over by the pope himself. This announcement is taken to mean that the recent trouble over the appointment of a co-adjutor for the San Francisco diocese has led Pope Pius to take the reins of government of the American church into his own hands, so that there will be no more discussion of modernism.

BLOCK REBUILDING OF 'FRISCO CITY HALL

San Francisco, Oct. 22.—After two years of waiting to tear down the ruins of the city hall, which was wrecked in the disaster of 1906, the board of supervisors is today facing a suit to restrain the members from tearing down the ruins and proceeding with the erection of a new building, as was recommended by the engineering board that examined the city hall, and decided upon the supervision. It is claimed by the millionaires bringing the suit that the supervisors have no right to rebuild the structure at a cost of \$6,000,000 without submitting it to the people.

LATHROP IS FOUND GUILTY

After deliberating five hours the jury found P. N. Lathrop guilty of perjury last night. This verdict brings to a close one of the most interesting cases up before Judge Burnett for some time, and when the jury left the court room for the council chambers yesterday at 1:30 o'clock, it was generally thought by those who had followed the case, that Lathrop would not be found guilty as charged. This is the first perjury case coming before the circuit court here for a good many years where there has been an offender found guilty. Judge Burnett set Saturday, the 24th, as the time for Lathrop's sentence. The sentence provided by law in this charge is from three to fifteen years' penal servitude.

DROWNED IN THE WILLAMETTE

While assisting in stretching a cable from the government dredge Westlowe to the shore, a man named Walter Thomas fell into the Willamette river just below the steel bridge yesterday afternoon and was drowned. The dredges crew witnessed the accident, and hurried to his assistance, but too late, as he had gone down for the last time. The point where the unfortunate man met his death was about two blocks below the steel bridge, on the west side of the river. Several people boys made a diligent search for the body, but owing to that particular part of the river being so swift, it has not yet been located. The drowned man's home or connections could not be learned.
