SEVERE CHARGES ARE MADE AGAINST SHERMAN

New York, Oct. 26.—The World this morning prints a story to the effect that James S. Sherman, Republican nominee for vice-president, was connected with a scheme to secure valuable timber lands in New Mexico for almost nothing through an act of congress in 1902.

The World says that the story was dictated to a representative of the paper by Edmund Burke, an attorney of Los Angeles, who was a partner of Sherman's at the time. The story is purported to have been dictated in the presence of Thomas S. Patterson, former United States senator, ex-Governor Osborne of Wyoming and W. J. Thomas, an attorney representing Burke.

BURKE DENIES HE MADE STATEMENT

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 26.—Following the publication by the New York World of charges that James S. Sherman of Republican nominee for vice-president was implicated in a plot to grab a vast amount of valuable land in New Mexico, Edmund Burke, the local attorney alleged to have given the information to the World, today denied that he made the statement. The World published the story today as having been dictated at Denver recently by Burke in the presence of T. M. Patterson and other witnesses.

BUTLER GETS AWAY WITH \$3000 WORTH OF GEMS

CHINESE PLANNED MASSACRE WHEN FLEET ARRIVED

Aoy, China, Oct. 26.—Chinese officials are taking summary measures to stamp out the plot for a general massacre of high Chinese by revolutionists which was to have been a tragic accompaniment to the arrival of the American battle-ship fleet. It has been discovered that the plot was far advanced and every effort is being made to apprehend the conspirators.

CONNECTICUT BANK CLOSES ITS DOORS

Middletown, Conn., Oct. 26.—The Columbia Trust company was ordered to close its doors today after an inspection of its books and accounts by National Bank Examiners Noble and Libell.

The institution was capitalized with \$100,000 and its liabilities were \$55,000.

It was announced that all depositors will be paid in full.

TAFT SPEAKS THREE TIMES IN CONNECTICUT

(United Press Leased Wire.)

New Haven, Conn., Oct. 26.—Asserting that the election of Bryan means a panic, William H. Taft delivered three addresses in this state today.

The Yale-Taft club met the candidate at the station here and, though it was raining, there was a big parade to the armory. Taft without an umbrella and bareheaded bowed to the crowd as his carriage passed along the streets. The rain poured down on his head and at times was almost blinding.

At the armory Taft was introduced by Governor Woodruff. On the platform were Congressman Lilly, the party candidate for governor, John Hayes Hammond and other leaders.

Congratulatory resolutions from the faculty and student body were presented to Taft. His address was received with great enthusiasm.

At Stamford Taft declared that Bryan has been the forerunner of prosperity by being defeated, and said that he hoped Bryan will bring prosperity this year by being defeated again. At Hartford and Stamford both, Taft requested votes on the ground that a victory for Bryan would cause a panic.

GOMPERS' STATEMENT PROVES BOOMERANG

Washington, D. C., Oct. 26.—After reading the statement made today by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, President Roosevelt caused the following to be given out from the White House:

"Mr. Gompers quotes from the President's conversation with him about George W. Alger's book, 'Moral Overstrain.' The President has distributed copies of that book to judges, labor leaders and others, and now earnestly wishes that Mr. Gompers would read this same Alger's admirable article on 'Taft and Labor,' in McClure's magazine for September, 1908. It is the most effective exposure of Gompers' position that has been produced."
