COURT HOUSE NEWS

A complaint was filed in the Circuit Court late Saturday afternoon by John A. Hughes against B. F. Sears to recover payment on property sold the defendant lying in Woodburn in the sum of \$1225. The complaint alleges two checks amounting to the sum demanded by Hughes were made out and delivered by Sears on the Ferndale bank at Ferndale, Humboldt county, Cal., and upon presentation of same the bank refused to honor them, and the amount is as yet due to the plaintiff.

A demurrer has been filed in the Circuit Court by attorneys John H. representing the Portland Railway & McNary and Franklin T. Griffith, Power Co., in a suit instigated by F. J. Goodenough to recover damages on the grounds that the complaint filed by the plaintiff does not contain sufficient facts to constitute a cause of action. Goodenough alleges in his complaint already filed that the street car company here seriously injured him while attempting to board a car at the intersection of State and High streets by starting out too soon.

The Circuit Court will again be in session on Monday next providing Judge Burnett completes his judicial engagement in Albany. If the judge does not finish his Albany business he will adjourn the court here until some later date.
