INSPECTING THE SANTIAM DISTRICT (Stayton Mall.)

On Tuesday of last week another party left Stayton for the Santiam mines, more especially the Gold Creek Mining & Milling company properties on Gold creek. The party left Stayton about 7:30 in the morning arriving at Gates for dinner. The dinner furnished was one not soon to be forgotten by those who partook of it. Mr. Hansen had telephoned ahead to Mr. Anderson and when the party arrived they had to wait but a few minutes before partaking of the mountainous repast. All pronounced it the best meal they had had since they left home. From Gates the party went up the long incline and down until they reached the Mehama road, from there on for several miles the road was par excellence. Arriving at the Cummings home the party stayed over night and were taken on in the early morning to the end of the wagon road which had been under construction by the mine owners of the Santiam district but more especially by the Gold Creek Mining & Milling company. They have charge of the work at present and the bridges which they are putting in will be paid for by Marion county. That in itself is a splendid and commendable move on the part of Marion county commissioners. They do not realize how much the residents of that section appreciate the apportionment for bridges. With the completion of the wagon road the residents of that section can take their surplus fruit, vegetables, etc., to the mines and find a ready market.

The citizens residing in the region of Elkhorn and intervening territory between Mehama have practically demonstrated that fruit raising in their section is but in its infancy. The finest apples that ever were tasted fell in the hands of the party while on their way into the district. The surprise expressed by those who ate of the fruit was immense. Japanese Floral Calendar.

Reference is frequently made to the floral calendar of Japan. What this calendar is explained in the Housekeeper. The Japanese are extremely fond of all flowers, and they have therefore made a calendar from them, giving to each month a favorite blossom or leaf. Thus the pine, the emblem of lasting prosperity and life, belongs to January, and its branches are used to decorate all houses on New Year's day. To February belong the blossoms of the plum tree, which stand for purity; and the beautiful blossoms of the peach tree, to which young girls are compared, are associated with the month of March. Next the cherry blossom, the most beloved of all flowers is held to belong to April, and to May are assigned the gorgeous clusters of the wistaria vine.

The iris flower, which is compared the strength and beauty of young boys, belongs to June and July has the glory and perfume of the water lily. The flowering hibiscus tree attaches its beauty to the month of August, while September lays claim to the exquisite charm of the azalea. The royal flower of Japan, the chrysanthemum, which forms a part of the crest of the imperial family, belongs to the month of October, while to November is given the maple leaf, admired for its decorative quality. Finally, with December is associated the beautiful camellia, which blooms in the gardens even in the midst of snow.

SPAULDING MILLS AT DALLAS MAY CLOSE

It is rumored that the Spaulding Logging company contemplates closing its sawmill in Dallas and calling in its men from the camps above this city for an indefinite time owing to difficulties in arriving at a satisfactory agreement with certain of the property owners along the LaCreole, who claim that the logs and the flooding necessary to bring them down from the camps to the sawmill are injuring their land.

B. C. Miles, manager of the company, was in Dallas last week looking into the matter, but, as yet, the directors have taken no definite action upon it.

In a letter, replying to a message of inquiry sent from the Observer, Mr. Miles says:

"The writer visited your city last week for the purpose of coming to a satisfactory agreement with some of the parties owning property along the river, who complained that the logs were damaging their places. I found some of these parties very reasonable and had no difficulty in coming to an understanding with them. Others, who were very slightly damaged, demanded that we spend a large sum in planking the banks or buy their land at much more than its actual value. Others asked that we keep the water from overflowing their land during the winter freshets.

"To satisfy these parties would require an outlay of from \$2000 to \$3000 and after the money was spent, we have no assurance that we would not be called upon for additional expense.

"I have called a meeting of our directors and will lay the matter before them with the recommendation that we suspend extensive operations on the La Creole river if we cannot come to a reasonable solution of the matter."

The Dallas sawmill and the logging camps from which it secures its timber furnish employment for from 80 to 125 men. Its payroll last year although the mill was closed for several months during the financial depression, amounted to nearly \$50,000. Should the company decide to suspend operations indefinitely it would mean the cutting off of an annual payroll of more than \$50,000, more than 100 men thrown out of employment and the cessation of one of the important industries that has proven a potent factor in the upbuilding of the city of Dallas.

The directors of the Spaulding Logging company have not yet made a definite decision as to what course they will pursue, but at present it seems likely that they will determine to suspend operations in Dallas indefinitely, unless an equitable agreement with the complaining property owners can be arrived at.

EPIDEMIC KILLING HORSES NEAR WALLA WALLA (East Oregonian.)

A report has reached this city of the death of a large number of horses belonging to farmers living about 10 miles west of Walla Walla. It is understood that 10 farmers have lost in the neighborhood of 160 horses and that the cause of death has not yet been determined, though different veterinarians have been called in and post mortem examinations have been held in a number of cases.

Though it has been impossible to discover any symptoms of any of the commonly encountered diseases or poisons, it is believed the animals are dying from the result of poison taken into the system through the eating of stubblefield fodder. It is well known that several different kinds of poisonous fungi are frequently found in stubblefields and it is thought that some of these must grow in the fields of the farmers who have been suffering such severe losses.

One man has lost 23 head of good work horses, but the most of the farmers concerned have lost on the average of 18 or 20. The first deaths occurred early in the summer, but the disease seems to still prevail.
