VARIOUS MILLS DOUBLE THEIR WORKING FORCE

Reports From Many States Show That Cotton, Shoe and Woolen Mills Have Received Big Orders.

New York, Oct. 27.—Dispatches received in this city from various parts of the country indicate that cotton, woolen and shoe factories have almost doubled their output within the last two weeks, while the prospects are bright for a big increase of employes in steel mills. Orders for those goods have piled up upon the manufacturers from jobbers who report that merchants in the west and south are laying in large supplies for the winter, and that the outlook is so bright that they are getting ready for the early spring trade. The activity of the mills in the New England and middle states also have given zest to retail trade and mills have seized upon men to put at looms or machines that the orders might be filled promptly.

The tremendous prosperity of the farmers in the west and of the planters in the south has started the spindles to double duty. Members of wholesale houses in this city with broad smiles on their faces tell of orders and of the cheerful news which they have received from various parts of the country. They say they have rallied the trials of panic and that they expect a further stimulus to trade in the election of William H. Taft as President.

"Everything is moving smoothly now," said Louis Stern, member of the firm of Stern Brothers, big dry goods merchants, "and only the election of Bryan can retard the development of business. It seems certain that Taft will be elected, because he is such an able man, and because his election would help business so tremendously. On the other hand Bryan is a man of unsettled ideas and his election would mean that business would make no headway for four years."

More Cotton and Woolen Mills Being Built.

There is a dearth of cotton goods and higher prices have set the spindles to turning merrily. The Modern cotton mills of Gastonia, N. C., are reported to be working on full time. The Calhoun mills of Calhoun Falls, S. C., have just been completed, and machinery is being installed, so that there will be employment for several thousand men within a short time. The W. S. Gray yarn mills of Woodruff, S. C., likewise are ready for the installation of machinery and for active operation within a month. The working force in Elizabeth City

hosiery mills, of Elizabeth City, N. C., has been doubled within the last two weeks, but more men will be employed as soon as the improvements and additions to the mills are completed. From Lexington, South Carolina, come the reports that all the mills in that county are working on full time. The output of the mills is estimated at about \$1,000,000 a year.

The demand for cotton goods has extended to the middle and New England states, and many men and women have received employment since the beginning of October. In Providence, Rhode Island, additions are being made to textile factories, while Manchester, N. H., mills promise within a month to give employment to 1000 operatives. The Stark mills of that city are employing more operatives every week. The Independent Cotton Manufacturing company of Providence, R. I., has been incorporated with a capital of \$200,000 while in Trenton, N. J., incorporation papers with a total capital of more than \$1,000,000 have been filed with the secretary of state. In Utica, New York, the thread mills have increased their working force greatly within the last few weeks, and it is said that there are enough orders to keep the mills running steadily.

Huge Orders for Steel Mills.

Reports from New Hampshire show that the shoe factories have received heavy orders for delivery in January, February and March. Boston wholesalers say that there is every prospect of a busy winter and that the slack trade of the summer will be more than made up in the winter trade.

The increase in the steel and iron trade is shown by preliminary estimates of the earnings of the United States Steel corporation for the third quarter of the year. The gross earnings, it is thought, will be five million dollars more than for the quarter ending on June 30. As the second quarter showed a gain over the preceding one, the activity in the billion dollar corporation is an index of gradually improving conditions. The gross earnings, it is estimated, for the last quarter will not be below \$26,000,000.

The Cambria Steel company, in Johnstown, Pa., is now reported to be working on full time, and other steel and iron mills are receiving impetus from large orders that have been placed by the railroads and other big corporations. The Cambria Steel company has received an order for 700 steel gondola cars from the Illinois Central Railway company. Their total cost will be \$1,000,000. The Pullman company has contracted

to build 220 steel cars for the Harriman lines. Other mills which have received orders, amounting to hundreds of thousands of dollars, are the Illinois Steel company, General Iron & Steel company, Carnegie Steel company, Lackawanna Steel company, Joliet Mills & Steel corporation. The indications are that the average output of the steel mills throughout the country will be increased from 60 per cent of capacity to 75 per cent within a reasonable time.

Railroads to Spend Millions.

That the railroads are beginning to spend more money on improvements and equipments is shown by the fact that many repair shops throughout the country are employing more men. The revival of the steel industry was forecasted today by a prominent manufacturer, who said: "At a meeting recently of railroad interests it was estimated that railroads and other concerns would soon require material worth \$300,000,000 for renewal purposes. If the railroads can get the money you need have no fear so far as the manufacturing end is concerned."

Among the mills which recently have increased their number of employes are the following: York Manufacturing company of York, Pa.; Bevin Brothers Manufacturing company of Hartford, Conn.; P. Derby & Co., Heywood Brothers & Lakewood, and John A. Dunn company, all of Gardner, Mass., manufacturers of chairs.

WOOL GROWERS TO MEET IN HEPPNER

Secretary Dan P. Smythe has issued a call for the eleventh annual session of the Oregon State Woolgrowers' association to meet in Heppner in November. This is one of the most important meetings to be held in the state this year and all sheepmen are notified to be present or represented, as the laws which they will advocate in congress this winter will be decided upon.

The question of overshadowing importance to be dealt with will be that of the leasing of the public domain, says the Pendleton Tribune. Last year Oregon opposed that policy and it is anticipated that they will do so again this year but the question is to be gone into thoroughly and every phase of it understood before recommending a policy to the delegation in congress. It is hoped to have the state's senators and representatives present so that they will be able to fully understand the sentiment of Oregon's wool growers.
