a cash and land credit aggregating \$10,000 upon their arrival.

American agriculturists are especially desired and those familiar with irrigation methods will be offered special inducements to come to the soil of this embryonic empire.

The plan in brief calls for the advancement of a land credit of \$7500 and a cash loan of \$2000 to be employed in purchasing stock and in erecting the first improvements.

The state of Victoria is an exact replica in soil and climate of California.

All of the other states of the commonwealth are formulating colonizing plans along similar lines.

Elwood Mead, for years in charge of the reclamation service in the western states and who is at present on leave of absence from the university of California, where he occupies the chair in the department of irrigation, is in charge of the irrigation projects undertaken by the Victorian government, and is enthusiastic over the possibilities of the agriculturists who accept the offer.

"Victoria is another California," said Mr. Mead in an interview, "and I am going to urge many of my agricultural friends to take advantage of this offer, which I think is without parallel in colonizing schemes ever undertaken by a government.

"There is something almost pathetic in the magnificent efforts of these wonderful people to hold their soil and resources for the benefit of people of their own race.

"Here they have a continent of almost indescribable wealth and the total population is less than five millions.

"They are determined to have no blood faint in their race and though many perplexing problems could be worked out with cooperation no Asiatic or other colored race is allowed entrance to the commonwealth.

"All Australia needs is people to make it one of the richest empires in the world.


