ALBANY NEWS

LATEST LIVE LOCAL AND PERSONAL NEWS FROM A BRIGHT VALLEY CITY.

Albany, Dr., Oct. 30.—(Special)—W. Hansard who was found guilty of selling liquor by the circuit court this week, through his attorney S. M. Garland, filed a motion with the county clerk for a new trial.

While playing whip cracker yesterday, Rex Allingham, the 14-year-old orphan boy, who lives with his mother, Miss Dolly Allingham, at Hallock, fell and broke both the bones of his left wrist. Miss Allingham was in Salem at the time of the accident.

The Albany College football team is working hard for the game tomorrow, when they will meet for the first time the team from the Chemawa Indian training school here on the local gridiron. Albany has a strong lineup with Dunbar, the famous O. A. C. tackle, and "big Yates," both at their positions in the line and a good back field. As Chemawa has the old Indian aggregation, it is expected to be a good game.

Mr. Strauder Froman, one of Linn

county's most respected pioneer residents died at his home in South Albany this morning of pneumonia, after a short illness. He was 76 years old. He is survived by a wife and two brothers Thomas and J. R. Froman, and three sisters. He was born in Danville, Illinois May, 1832, and crossed the plains with his parents in 1856 settling in Chico, Cal. He came to Oregon in 1861, settling on a large 320-acre farm three miles southeast of Albany. The deceased was president and one of the organizers of the Albany Creamery Association, a member of St. John's lodge, No. 17 A. F. & A. M., and a very prominent Granger.

eral women and children from adjoining tenements which were threatened with destruction.

The blaze is believed to have started in the rear of the building in the dynamo room from the short-circuiting of wires and by the time the engines arrived the rear part of the factory was ablaze.

While the firemen attacked the flames in the larger structure lines of hose were run into the buildings at the rear and by hard work these were saved.

The panic stricken women were with difficulty prevented by the police from returning to their homes and rescuing their valuables.

Charles Dougherty and James Quinlan, truckmen and George Spellman, hoseman, were struck by flying debris from a falling wall and seriously hurt. They were removed to the hospital.

The damage will amount to \$60,000.

U. S. FORESTS WILL BE DESTROYED IN 30 YEARS

Washington, D. C., Oct. 30.—The experts of the forest service estimated today that in less than 30 years the virgin timber of the United States will have been destroyed, if the present rate of cutting continues. The great forests are rapidly being depleted of their timber by the sawmills and forest fires.

The experts point to the fact that the consumption of lumber based on a per capita apportionment is 500 feet of timber annually. They point to the economy of European coun-

tries by showing the annual consumption to be 60 feet per capita.
