WOULD RECOVER LAND CLAIMS

Some more trouble has now been stored up against the State Land Board in the way of a complaint filed in the circuit court yesterday by one W. J. Pinney to prohibit the state board from canceling certificates of sale, which, they allege, are void and fraudulent.

The complaint alleges that the plaintiff Pinney, bought 320 acres of school land and paid \$80 of the purchase price down, for which he was given a certificate of sale. At a latter date, prior to his purchase of the school lands, he bought two more sale certificates at a valuable consideration, one from John L. McBacken and the other from F. R. Boyce, but upon presenting his receipts to make further payments on the property the board requested him also to show the certificates of sale which he did. The board then informed him they would be compelled to make further examination of the certificates, as several "forged" applications had been reported. Then the complaint alleges that the board declared them can-

celed and void, notwithstanding his many requests, to allow further proceedings in the payment on the land.
The land in question is situated in Lake county, Oregon.
Attorneys Wm. Lord, B. B. Beckman and E. B. Watson are appearing for Pinney.
