### MORSE TRIAL IS SOON TO BE FINISHED

New York, Oct. 31.—That the trial of Charles W. Morse, the icing, and Alfred H. Curtis, on charges of wrongfully manipulating the affairs of the National Bank of North America is nearing its close, is apparent from the announcement of United States District Attorney Stimson today that the government has finished its cross-examination of Morse.

It is intimated that the examination of other important witnesses, held in abeyance by the prosecution, will be brief or will not be taken up. The case may go to the jury next Monday.

Curtis and Morse were smiling when they appeared in the court room today. From their amicable attitude it is surmised that past differences between them have been adjusted.

On re-direct examination, Morse denied absolutely that any knowledge or information about the loans of the Bank of New Amsterdam to Miss Kate Wilson, a stenographer, had been withheld from Comptroller of the Currency Ridgely.

He said that if the government was misled at the time of its investigation, it was because of confidence of employees in the bank's integrity and through no ill intent. The new Amsterdam bank was one in which Morse was interested.

the threats of war in the near east is said to have been a factor in his retirement.

It was stated here late this afternoon that Von Bulow's resignation was precipitated as the result of an interview given to the London Telegraph by Von Bulow a few days ago in which the Kaiser is quoted as taking credit for the war plan by which England crushed the Boers.

The interview was published without the authorization of the emperor, and without consultation before it was given out to the press by Chancellor Von Bulow, who is regarded as having been guilty of a breach of confidence in the administration of his official duties.

It is stated that the chancellor, believing that he would be held answerable to the reichstag for allowing the interview to be published, resigned.

**RUMORED BREACH HAS BEEN PATCHED**

Berlin, Oct. 31.—After his resignation had been announced officially and cabled to all parts of the world, Chancellor Von Bulow tonight reconsidered his action and it was announced by the government that the differences between the emperor and the Chancellor had been adjusted.

The Kaiser, after having accepted the resignation, invited the chancellor to remain in office. It is understood that it has been agreed that the chancellor will assume full re-

sponsibility for the Kaiser's interview in the London Telegraph, although he did not see it before it was published.

### ROOSEVELT EXPOSES ROCKEFELLER TRICK

Washington, D. C., Oct. 31.—(United Press Leased Wire.) President Roosevelt today authorized the following statement:

"The president has received numerous letters and telegrams showing that John D. Rockefeller's trick, doubtless made by agreement with the Democrats, will fail absolutely. It is self-evident, as Taft says, if Rockefeller really wanted him elected, he would have kept quiet."

The following telegram was made public:

"Cleveland, O., Oct. 31.—To President Roosevelt, Washington, D. C.—The labor vote will not be deceived by Rockefeller's trick. We will bury him with Tom Johnson. This county is as safely Republican as are Ohio and the electoral college (signed) A. L. Faulkner, President of the Window Glass Workers of America."

A conference this afternoon between the president and Attorney Frank B. Kellogg, the chief "trust buster," indicates that a new move in the government's suit against the Standard Oil Company may be made on Monday.

After the conference, Kellogg said positively that under no circumstances would immunity be promised or given to Rockefeller in connection with the federal cases against the Standard.
