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FEAR MISSING GIRL WAS MURDERED FOR SAVINGS

Oakland, Cal., Nov. 2.—Pinkerton detectives on both sides of San Francisco today are seeking the mysterious stranger with whom missing Edna Clark, the 19-year-old art student, was last seen. Recent developments in the case have caused the withdrawal of Attorney S. B. Wright, a friend of the family, from directing the search, and have placed the girl's uncle, A. E. Yates, in charge.

The theory that the men of "The Eye" are working under is that Miss Clark was persuaded by the stranger to draw her money from a local bank and meet him. The detectives believe that his motive was robbery. They are also of the belief that the

man has secretly murdered the girl. Investigation by detectives at the bank revealed that Miss Clark took with her only \$300.

Since thinking the matter over the private detectives agree that a man, who was known as a friend of the girl, and who has been under suspicion, was exonerated by an investigation.

It is believed that Mrs. Louis Mack, Edna's mother, has given the detectives important clues, in a statement she made yesterday to the Pinkertons. The family has refrained from discussing the case with outsiders. They have consulted the police but little in the mysterious affair, and the authorities have abandoned the search.

The troops are under the command of General Nicholas Rolland, a former revolutionary leader.

It is stated here that the cruiser Utrecht will be sent to Venezuela from here and that the Dutch cruisers in the Caribbean sea and the East Indies will be rushed to enforce the blockade.

Hong Kong, Nov. 2.—Several Chinese rioters were killed today in a clash between armed police and soldiers and the Japanese quarter of the city is now under military patrol.

LETTER SHOWS ROOSEVELT APPROVED OF LILLEY

Waterbury, Conn., Nov. 2.—Representative George L. Lilley, who exposed the submarine boat scandal in congress last winter and who now is the Republican candidate for governor, today published a communication between him and President Roosevelt regarding the present campaign with Roosevelt's consent.

The first letter was written by Lilley to the President asking Roosevelt to allow him to quote Roosevelt's approval of his support in the house on April 11, as expressed by the President to Lilley's friends.

In reply the President said he did not remember the speech referred to and suggested that Lilley send him a copy of it.

Lilley sent the copy and told the President that a pamphlet containing it was being prepared for circulation among factory workers.

"I have read and heartily approve the speech. You told a number of needed truths. I wish you success in your career."

The correspondence was published because it was charged that Lilley had misquoted the President.
