The city registration to date shows an increase of voters in Salem of 200 over that of last year, another good indication toward the growth of the Capital City. ### HAINS TRIAL IS SET FOR MONDAY

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
New York, November 2.—After a prolonged argument between counsel relative to the date for beginning the trial of Thornton Jenkins Hains, indicted with Captain Peter Hains for the killing of William E. Aunis, the case was set for trial next Monday in Judge Aspinwall's court.

The two brothers were in court today while the attorneys argued on the motion of the district attorney that the trial of Thornton Hains be set for Monday.

Hains' attorneys argued in vain for a further postponement on the ground that Captain Hains, who will be one of the chief witnesses in the case is mentally unfit to testify.

### THEFT OF SLAVE GIRL STARTS A TONG WAR

San Francisco, Nov. 2.—Two of the largest Chinese tongs in America are involved in a war today originating in a fight over a wealthy merchant's slave girl, who was abducted and then stolen from her abductors. Two trade tongs are warring over fancied grievances at the same time, and the Chinese are keeping the police of the Chinese quarter on the alert today for hostilities.

Quang Yik Wo, a merchant of the Suey Ong tong, reported the loss of Lee Toy, his slave girl, a week ago to his brethren. A day later the girl was traced to a house in Oakland, occupied by members of the Ong Yik tong.

Two days later the girl was brought back to this city in a cab under the armed escort of two Suey Ong tong men, and later the Suey Ongs called for an indemnity of \$1150. After a discussion the indemnity was awarded and the amount paid by the Ong Yiks.

The details of the transaction were published in a Chinese paper, and the Ong Yik declared war.

A war between the Sen Suey Yings and the Suey Sings started over a bottle of gin that was shipped from China to a Suey Sling. A Sen Suey tongman opened it by mistake, and it is believed a conflict will result.

### SAILING SHIP'S UNDERGO TERRIBLE EXPERIENCES

San Francisco, Nov. 2.—The crews of the sailing vessels Lucipara and California are relating today tales of the most terrible of experiences undergone by seamen. They were towed into port late last night, both crippled by the storms through which they had sailed from Europe, and with the men exhausted from their terrible fight against the elements.

The four-masted bark Lucipara, 143 days from Antwerp, reports the worst voyage of the two. The vessel was caught in a storm off Cape Horn August 25. The heavy seas swept her decks clean of everything, and the crew was kept busy for days cutting away wreckage.

When the storm had subsided it was discovered that there were four feet of water in the hold. The seams had sprung a leak in the storm and the crew had to pump for several days to keep from sinking.

The vessel finally made this port with the crew exhausted with continual pumping and fighting against the storms.

The four-masted bark California, 198 days from Rotterdam, was caught in the same hurricane. Her cargo shifted, and she was in danger of sinking every minute. When the vessel reached Coquimbó, September 16, there was no food on board, and the water had just been exhausted.

The crews of both vessels are exhausted from their fight and will rest here for several months before going to sea again.

### GERMANY BADLY HANDED BY RUSSIA

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Berlin, Nov. 2.—That Russia "sold out" Germany to England in the early phases of the Balkan crisis is the slightly veiled bluff of diplomats of the Fatherland today in view of the announcement of Russia's expected withdrawal from the proposed conference.

The opinion here is that Great Britain held the lure of gold before the eyes of the Russias by promising to float a great Russian loan if the czar's nation would stand by England against Germany and its ally, Russia.

It is well established that foreign minister, Sir Edward Grey of England, took the Russian foreign min-

ister, Iswolsky, to see high financiers while the latter was interested, and there is strong suspicion that promises in the Balkan matter were made by both sides.

Russia approached Germany on the subject of a loan, it is rumored, while Iswolsky was on his way to London and after the German financiers had declined to float the loan, Russia lost interest in Germany.

It has been definitely announced that Russia is about to secure the loan from English capitalists but the amount has not yet been made public.

### SPECIAL TRAIN TO OYSTER BAY

Washington, D. C., Nov. 2.—When Roosevelt enters the booth tomorrow at Oyster Bay, his son, Theodore Jr., will be in an adjoining booth casting his first ballot for a party. The presidential party from Washington to Oyster Bay occupies three cars, one of them exclusively for Roosevelt.
