Some interesting matters were brought up in the meeting of the city council last evening, which were hotly argued by the members. The first business taken up by the body was the saloon license applied for by George Patterson, who is now proprietor of the Talkington place. Alderman Pressnell strongly objected to the renewing of a license to Patterson on the grounds he was two days late in making application for a new permit. Pressnell's objections were overruled, however, and the liquor license was ordered issued to Patterson.

taken in hand by the city for delinquent taxes. The petitioner also desires to pay the assessment on street improvement in front of the property. The city attorney was also instructed to make an examination of the property, and report at the next regular meeting. A petition was then read requesting that the council transfer the liquor license of August Schrieber to Otto A. Kklep, it being claimed Schrieber is no tth proper kind of a saloon keeper. Councilman Radcliffe commented strongly against Schrieber being permitted to hold a license, stating that the conditions of his saloon were no better than those of the houses on Ferry street, and that minors were frequently seen in the place, even after Schrieber had faced a jury, though acquitted on the charge of violating the liquor law. He closed stating that he would not be a party to granting Schrieber a license at all, and was in favor of revoking the present one. The petition presented by Pressnell asked that the council revoke the saloon man's license on the same ground as argued by Radcliffe. The council then took a vote on the proposition, and the petitions were granted and Schrieber's license revoked. A resolution was passed for the improvement of Ferry street, from waterproof bitulithic pavement. Alderman Elliott addressed the council regarding the bad condition of Bush street on the north side of A. Duque's store, in So. South Sa. St. Mr. Duque agreed to haul the necessary gravel to make the fills if the council would purchase the material. The council looked favorably upon the request and ordered the street improved. A bill to establish an up-to-date health board was introduced during the meeting, which got the approval of most of the councilmen. The bill set forth the great demand for a thoroughly organized board of health with an expert physician at the head of it.
