FAIR GROUNDS BOULEVARD WILL BE A HUMMER SURE

One Hundred Feet Wide and Parked on Each Side—A Magnificent Avenue That Will Boost All Property in That Part of Greater Salem—Ready for Action When the State Fair Board Meets.

An 100-foot wide boulevard from the state capital to the state fair grounds is to be constructed. Some of the best boosters in this city are backing the movement. Tuesday night when the crowds were shouting on the streets earnest men were planning at the Board of Trade rooms how to construct in time for the next state fair a splendid highway that shall be credit to the state and the city.

Aldermen Stockton, Elliott and Low were present, as were Messrs. Albert, Lawrence, and Scott, representing the business men. Col. Stockton was made chairman, and a resolution was adopted endorsing the action of the city council ordering Capital street to be opened. Lawrence, Low and Scott were appointed to look up a feasible and direct route for the grand boulevard. No street is to be considered that does not meet the 100-foot requirement.

Will Be a Hummer.

The fair grounds boulevard is to be a hummer from the good roads standpoint. Judge Scott, the state highway commissioner, is to be placed in charge of the whole thing. All efforts to make it a splendid monument of progress will be encouraged. The state fair board, the city, the county, the state and the property owners are to be enlisted in a co-operative program, to properly grade, drain, and macadamize a highway there that shall be mudless and dustless.

The boulevard is to be parked and made an airline thoroughfare for the use of all kinds of vehicles and street-cars are to be kept off. When the state fair board meets at Salem early in December, it is expected to have a plan and specifications ready to submit to them for their approval.

PHILIPPINE REJOICE OVER TAFT'S ELECTION

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Manila, P. I., Nov. 4.—The Americans of Manila and the men of the fleet today are celebrating the election of Taft to the presidency.

The people of Manila expect an entire change of policy on the part of the government toward the islands under the administration of President Taft, owing to his intimate knowledge of the Philippine islands, and his extensive experience here as governor.

It is expected that strict restraint will be exercised over the agitators, who have been clamoring for immediate self-government for the Philippines, and there is little doubt that the mere fact of Taft's election will quiet much of this talk.

The general impression prevails that General Luke E. Wright, secretary of war, will have active charge of the Philippine islands. As Gen-

eral Wright also served as governor of the Philippines, the islands expect to receive much attention under the administration of President Taft.

The firmness of General Wright, in handling politicians, is well known, and it is expected that he will take vigorous methods of directing the island affairs.

Both Taft and Wright have many friends in Manila, and there is much rejoicing at the success of the Republican party. Americans here are looking forward to an era of great prosperity and extensive industrial development.

The men of the fleet, a large majority of whom are ardent supporters of President Roosevelt, are delighted at the result of the election, not alone because of their admiration for Taft, but because they look upon it as an endorsement by the people of Roosevelt's administration.

BEVERIDGE WINS OVER FAIRBANKS

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 4.—The result of the Fairbanks political marriage as the powerful factor in the state, is forecasted by the defeat of Fairbanks men, and the utterance of his organization yesterday. Fairbank's candidate for governor, has lost to Marshall, the rest of the Republican ticket was successful.

Senator Hemenway, a Fairbanks man, beaten for re-election by the legislature by the Democrats. Representative Beveridge, in the seventh district, and Fairbanks men, are apparently defeated for re-election.

Senator Beveridge has always been close to the Roosevelt administration, while Fairbanks has never been identified with it. The new election puts enormous power in the hands of Beveridge, and gives the opportunity to build up a name much greater and more effective than that constructed by the president.

Thomas Taggart, former national chairman of the Democratic party, is jubilant over the results in the

state. He declared today that the legislature will be Democratic by a big majority.

CELEBRATES ELECTION BY BURNING AUTO

Santa Rosa, Cal., Nov. 4.—A pile of ashes and twisted iron today marks the remains of the "Hoodoo" automobile destroyed last night by James Luppold in celebrating the election of Taft. The evil spirits which Luppold professed to believe haunted the machine were nowhere in sight today and the owner firmly believes that they have forever fled from his life. In honor of the occasion he gave a banquet last night to a number of friends.

Another "hoodoo" is believed to have been removed, as in the pyre of the automobile there was placed a bale of 1907 hops, a part of the famous "Hoodoo" crop of that year.

When Luppold some weeks ago told of his intention to burn the auto he was flooded with letters from all parts of the state; the writers protesting against the act. Tempting offers were made its owner, sentimental pleas for its preservation and caustic references to its wanton destruction were received. Luppold refused all offers, remained obdurate to all pleas, and personally applied the torch that created his four-wheeled Nemesis.

SUSPICION REMOVED FROM EPISCOPAL MINISTER

San Francisco, Nov. 4.—The suspicion under which Reverend Payson Young, rector of the Episcopal church of St. Mary the Virgin, of this city, has been cast in connection with the disappearance of Edna Clark of Oakland, was removed today by the statement of the minister to the relatives of the girl.

The statement of the rector, following a long interview last night between him, A. E. Yates, the girl's uncle and Attorney S. B. Wright, a friend of the family.

Suspicion was directed toward the minister by the fact that he was seen in the company of Clark before her disappearance and had called once at her home.

Father Young declares that Miss Clark called at the rectory on religious matters and that they became quite well acquainted. During their acquaintance the girl told him that her home life was unhappy because of differences between herself and her mother. The minister says that he called once on Miss Clark but gathered from the manner of Miss Clark's mother that he was an unwelcome guest and did not call again.

Father Young says that he did not see the missing girl after that. He admits endeavoring to persuade her not to become a nun and says that she intimated that she might become a trained nurse.

The detectives working on the strange case are beginning to admit the hopelessness of their work.

WOMAN CAUGHT TRYING TO TAKE \$200,000 BONDS

Chicago, Nov. 4.—Local detectives today sent back to Babcock, Rushton and Lunderback, bond dealers, over \$200,000 worth of bonds obtained from a woman who called herself Altee Cheney Brown, just as she was preparing to leave this city yesterday with the bonds in her possession. The woman was pinned under arrest while she was seated in the Denver train, but was allowed to go after giving up the bonds and \$65 to the management of the Congress Hotel company.

The woman purchased the bonds and paid her hotel bill with checks on the Farmers Loan & Trust company of New York and when the brokers became suspicious of the checks, they telegraphed to New York and learned that there was no account in the bank under the woman's name.

The woman was traced to the Denver train, which was due to leave in a few minutes. She had gotten on the train by inducing a woman to allow her to carry a baby. Neither the brokers nor the hotel company care to prosecute the woman.

VANCOUVER TO PLAY CALIFORNIA TODAY
