COURT HOUSE NEWS

A bill of exceptions was filed in the circuit court this morning by Carson & Brown, attorneys for Laura Palmer, who has sued the Portland Railway Light & Power company for injuries received through the alleged carelessness charged in the complaint. This matter has been pending in the circuit court for a number of sessions, having been postponed. The plaintiff alleges in her complaint that the Portland Railway Light & Power company car collided with a buggy in which she and her husband were occupants, throwing them to the ground and causing them to sustain injuries to the extent that damages are demanded from the electric road in the sum of \$10,425.

The case of John A. Hughes vs. B. F. Sears, an action for money, the attorneys for the parties came to a settlement and the matter was dismissed.

Judge Burnet adjourned court this morning until Monday, the 30th of November, at which time there are several pending cases to be heard and probably a few arguments on some new complaints.

Circuit Judge Wm. Galloway, of department No. 2, will hold court here the remainder of the week. The divorce case in which Riley B. Wray asks to be divorced from his wife, Anna W. Wray, will be again taken up. Rauch, Senn & Seit, of Silverton, appear for the plaintiff, and Carson & Brown for the defendant. Elizabeth Claggett vs. W. D. Claggett, parties in another divorce proceedings, will probably have a hearing at this term of court. Carson & Brown appear as advisers for the plaintiff, and Kaiser & Pogue for the defendant. This is a suit derived from several other dissatisfactions with which the public are familiar between the two in question.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 4.—Returns from all portions of the state indicate that the direct primary amendment to the constitution of the state was carried by a large majority. In most counties, the vote was 2 to 1 in favor of the amendment. In some counties, it stood as high as 6 to 1 and even 10 to 1.

DENEEN WINS OUT

(Continued from page 1)

Taft has carried New York by about 200,000; Ohio by 100,000; Illinois by 200,000. Oregon was carried by the top-notch section of the Republicans, 25,000 majority in favor of Taft. The closest of the big states was in Indiana, where the Taft majority is between 10,000 and 10,000. The states which are still to be heard from, and which return, in all, 13 electoral votes on either side, are in the far west.

Governor Hughes, in New York, and nearly all the governors for reform principles have been elected.

Opposite to predictions and estimates Deneen (Rep.) has defeated Stevenson (Dem.) in the race for the governorship of Illinois by close on to 75,000 votes and Taft's majority in the state will be close to 200,000.

The present cabinet officers will remain in office, with the exception of Bonaparte, Wright and Metcalf, who will resign.

Nebraska has remained true to Bryan and given him a 10,000 majority. A Democratic governor is also believed to have been elected.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 4.—With 75 precincts yet to register their votes at the city hall, the indications today are that James G. Maguire, Democratic candidate in the fourth congressional district may nose out his Republican opponent, Julius Kahn, the incumbent. This would give California one Democrat in the house of representatives.

Later returns indicate Taft's lead in the state over Bryan will be 75,000. While Frank J. Murasky, Democrat, led his Republican opponent, Henry A. Melvin, in San Francisco in the race for the supreme justiceship, he is unable to meet the vote Melvin brought in from the state.

With few exceptions the so-called machine Republicans beat the independent wing of the party by approximately three assemblies to 21. The figures received this morning indicate that 74 Republicans and six Democrats will be returned to the assembly.

The state senate is a clean sweep for the Republicans, the regulars securing 17 in the upper house of the legislature and the Independents three.

For judges of the superior courts in the counties outside of San Francisco the Republican nominees, with few exceptions were the victors. In San Francisco the early fight on five with a slight lead after an anti-graft campaign and four Republican judges completing the long term ticket. For the short term, Golden (Rep.) was defeated by abanias (Dem.).

Returns from 24 precincts in which verified this morning, and returns from 50 other precincts, which have been counted, indicate that Judge Frank H. Dunne will defeat Carroll Cook for judge of the superior court. There are four judges to be elected for the long term and one for the short term. George H. Cavanaugh, Democrat, has been elected for the short term over Isadore Golden, Republican.

For the long term Judges Hunt and George A. Sturtevant seem to have a lead that assures them places at the head of the ticket. Judge Dunne, Democrat, and Judge John Van Nostrand, Republican, are fighting for the third place on the ticket.

At 9 o'clock this morning it looked like Dunne would be third and Van Nostrand fourth.

San Francisco, Nov. 4.—Returns received by the United Press at noon today from all parts of the state indicate that the California capital removal bill has been defeated.

Southern California and the interior counties are overwhelmingly against the bill.

Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 4.—The tally of complete returns from over the state give Taft a plurality of 87,962. The entire Republican ticket is elected by 50,000. The legislature will be elected to congress. The balance of the state is for Bryan.

Idaho Republican.
Boise, Idaho, Nov. 4.—Taft's plurality in Idaho probably will be 15,000. Jas. H. Brady, Republican, is elected for the legislature to 5000. The legislature will be Republican on joint ballot.

Cannon Happy.
Danville, Ill., Nov. 4.—Speaker Joseph G. Cannon this afternoon gave out the following statement: "The returns so far indicate that I have received a plurality of 8000 which is slightly in excess of the normal. In view of the persistent opposition of President Gompers and his agents and the attack of the leaders of the anti-saloon league, the outcome is extremely gratifying to me. It indicates that though some good people outside the district were deceived, the people inside the district understand the real situation. "I am gratified that the Republican party has achieved such a splendid victory. The election of Taft and Sherman, with a Republican congress, no doubt will result in a complete restoration of confidence. The party will keep the pledges made in the platform. We can and will revise the tariff, giving full protection to the employe. The revision can be promptly accomplished, after the inauguration of Judge Taft, without disturbing business conditions."

WHAT GOMPERS SAYS ABOUT THE ELECTION
Washington, D. C., Nov. 4.—President Samuel Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, this afternoon said: "This is not the first time in the struggles of the masses that entrenched wealth, privilege and power have gained material, even though temporary victory. "The moral influence of the campaign is what advances the cause of the workers. "Our actions have been consistent, persistent and persistent, and we will achieve for the toilers the triumph of the cause of labor, and the cause of human justice. "Though temporarily defeated, ta-

bor is not conquered. The future is ours."

Multnomah County.
Portland, Or., Nov. 4.—Multnomah county gave Taft 18,021 votes and Bryan 10,031. That is what the complete returns show. In all Multnomah county Higgen, candidate of the Independence party, received but 53 votes. Eugene V. Debs received 1399 votes and the Prohibition party polled 680 for its candidate. Only three precincts in the county gave a majority to Bryan. Of these precincts 74 gave Taft 115 votes and Bryan 170, precinct 75 gave Taft 136 and Bryan 130; precinct 107 gave Taft 15 and Bryan 17. The first two are Albina precincts, the voting place of the longshoremen and precinct 107 Ispn Sauvier Island. The total vote cast in the county was 38,190.
