

# Chief Gibson Issues Orders Against Drunks

"THERE ARE THREE REASONS WHY I PROPOSE THAT ALL DRUNKS SHALL BE KEPT OFF THE STREETS AND OUT OF BUSINESS PLACES, AND IF FOUND INTOXICATED IN EITHER PLACE WILL BE ARRESTED AND PUT IN JAIL AND FINED FOR THE MISDEMEANOR OF DRUNKENNESS.

FIRST—THERE IS A STRONG PUBLIC SENTIMENT AGAINST DRUNKENNESS IN PUBLIC PLACES.

"SECOND—THERE IS STRONGER SENTIMENT THAT THE LAWS SHALL BE ENFORCED AGAINST DRUNKENNESS. THE SALOON KEEPER AND THE DRUGGIST PAY A LICENSE TO CONDUCT THEIR BUSINESS AND ARE ENTITLED TO PROTECTION AGAINST THE MAN WHO GETS DRUNK, AS MUCH AS SOCIETY IS."

"THIRD—WITH OUR PAVED STREETS AND FAST MOVING STREET CARS, WITH STREETS THAT CAN BE CROSSED ANYWHERE BY DAY OR NIGHT, THERE IS GREAT DANGER OF ANY INTOXICATED MAN GETTING KILLED, AS HAPPENED THE OTHER DAY.

"FOR THE ABOVE REASONS, AND BECAUSE IT IS MY DUTY, I PROPOSE TO RID THIS CITY OF DRUNKS, AND INSTRUCT MY MEN TO ENFORCE THIS ORDER TO THE LETTER."

## DYNAMITED

Winnipeg, Nov. 5.—A report received here at noon says that seven men were killed when a Grand Trunk train ran down a party of men 200 miles east of here today.

Winnipeg, Nov. 5.—Seven men were blown to pieces today by a premature explosion of dynamite 100 miles east of here on the Grand Trunk railroad. Five Americans, one of whom was the foreman, were among the victims.

## KILLS MAN WITH FIST; CHARGED WITH MANSLAUGHTER

Seattle, Nov. 5.—Frank Poquett, the Seattle barber, who caused the death of W. W. King, formerly of Minneapolis, with a blow of his fist on election day, was today formerly charged with manslaughter.

Angered because his companion would not contribute \$10 for an automobile trip to a suburb, Poquett struck King, who was a millhand, a powerful blow under the ear with his fist. King fell to the sidewalk unconscious, dying a few minutes later.

Poquett still insists that he does not remember striking King, but William Booth, who claims he was

also assaulted by Poquett, says the barber struck King.

King came to Seattle from Minneapolis three months ago, where it is said he has relatives. Poquett was fined \$75 more than a year ago for breaking a man's jaw with his fist.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 5.—The Democrats have elected four and possibly five congressmen from Nebraska. The sixth district is doubtful.



San Francisco, Nov. 5.—With but a few scattering precincts yet to be heard from, returns from all parts of the state indicate the re-election of California Republican congressmen by approximately the following pluralities:

- First district—William F. Englebright, 6000.
- Second district—Duncan E. McKinlay, 4000.
- Third district—Joseph R. Knowland, 16,500.
- Fourth district—Julius Kahn 1646 (returns complete).
- Fifth district—A Hayes, 3469 (returns complete).
- Sixth district—James C. Needham, 4800.
- Seventh district—James McLachlan, 7650.
- Eighth district—S. C. Smith, 8300.

## NOW TAFT IS AHEAD IN MARYLAND

Baltimore, No. 5.—Returns at 11 o'clock today indicate that Taft will carry the state by a plurality of 146 votes.

One county is yet to be heard from. The official count was begun today. The result will not be known positively until it is completed.

## CHINESE OFFICIALS CAUSED BOYCOTT SAY JAPS

Tokio, Nov. 5.—It is intimated here today by Japanese diplomats that the sudden outbreak against Japanese and Japanese goods in Hong Kong was carefully and cunningly premeditated by Chinese officials. Veiled hints are made that the Chinese were instigated to the plot by European merchants.

The possibility of a further complication with Japan was avoided according to the Japanese, by the quick action of the Chinese, in preventing the mob from injuring Japanese merchants and their shops, although some of the more fanatical members eluded the armed police and did nominal damage.

## BATTER GETS NO ROOM AT WALDORF ASTORIA

New York, Nov. 5.—"Battling" Nelson is stouping at a small hotel here today after being turned away last night from the Waldorf Astoria.

Nelson applied at New York's fashionable hostelry for a room and bath but prize fighters are not wanted at the hotel. "Philadelphia Jack" O'Brien was recently turned away for that reason. O'Brien became furious when he was refused admission, but Nelson quietly walked away and made no protest.

When "the batter" applied for a room the clerk recognized him and called him by name. Nelson answered and the clerk told him that all the rooms were taken. He was sorry and did not know when a room would be vacant.

Mack, caused Miss Clark to leave, the police believe that she will be found either in the hospital of an Eastern city or in a local hospital under an assumed name. That she is dead they do not believe.

Last night a stranger called for Mrs. Mack over the telephone, and in the absence of the mother, told a member of the girl's family that Edna Clark would be found today in an Oakland convent. Inquiry at all religious places showed the assertion to be untrue.

The connection of Father Payson Young, rector of the High Church Episcopal parish with the case has caused a great sensation, and has aroused the keenest interest, especially in the parish, where he has enemies. The rector has submitted calmly to sharp cross-examination, and has answered all questions. No evidence against him of any kind has been found.

W. H. Grimmelman, the agent of the Pullman Company who sold the ticket, the stub of which was found in the church, identified a photograph of Miss Clark, and said he was positive he sold her a ticket at about that time.

## VANCOUVER DEFEATS STANFORD AT FOOTBALL

Stanford University, Cal., Nov. 5. Vancouver football team played a fast game yesterday, when they defeated the Stanford team by a score of 11 to 3. The collegians today point to the fact that three of the Cardinals beat men were not in the game. There is much disappointment, however, owing to the comparison with the 3-0 score of the California University.

The Stanford players, however, are not discouraged, and will endeavor to take the second game from the visitors.

The record of the Vancouver team so far is a tie and a victory from California, and a victory from Stanford.

Football critics are unanimous that Vancouver played a faster and a superior game than did her opponents.

## DEMOCRATIC GOVERNOR IN NORTH DAKOTA

Fargo, N. D., Nov. 5.—The returns early today confirm the election of Burke (Democrat) for governor although by a majority much less than that of two years ago. There is no possibility of Johnson (Rep.) being able to overtake him.
