CALIFORNIA SEEKS HAY IN OREGON

San Francisco, Nov. 5.—The hay dealers all over the state have shut down on the selling of hay today, following the publication of a report by the San Francisco Hay Association this morning that there is a possibility of all the horses and cattle of the state being put on short rations as the result of the hay shortage. The price of hay today is \$24 a ton against a price of from \$15 to 18 at this time last year, and it is stated that before the week is over it will soar to \$26.

The dry year in Nevada and Utah, which states usually help out California in times of hay famine, report a shortage, and the available crops have been bought up. California hay men are looking to Oregon and Washington to make up their shortage.

Careful crop reports from all parts of the state indicate that there are 1,000,000 tons less available now than there was at this time last year. It is estimated that if the consumption for the coming five months are as slow as the two-thirds of the last season, there is no reason to believe the market will be absolutely cleaned out.

The hay merchants say they are facing a serious proposition, in the obtaining of hay for horses and cattle in the coming months. Twenty thousand tons a month is said to be consumed in San Francisco, and an equally large amount in the interior.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC TO HAVE ELECTRIC TRAINS

San Francisco, Nov. 5.—The Berkeley trustees today are considering an offer by the Southern Pacific to spend \$2,000,000 to improve in exchange for permission to change the motive power of the road and extend the system in Berkeley.

The Southern Pacific officials announce they desire to change the road from steam to electricity in the operation of trains of the interurban lines. They also wish to extend the line northward from the city to Contra Costa county joining the line at North Berkeley. A line to reach to the campus of the University of California will also be built if permission is granted by the board.

MUCH WORK OF CUPID UNDONE

Judge William Galloway of circuit court No. 2, handed decrees to six unsatisfied couples yesterday afternoon, and severed the matrimonial bonds of each. Most of the marriage trouble was the result of desertion or cruel treatment.

J. B. Presnall was given a decree in the suit for a divorce from his wife, Bertha Presnall, whom, he claimed, deserted him without cause and refused to have anything further to do with him.

The long pending divorce suit of Kuley B. Wray against his wife, Anna W. Wray, was brought to a close yesterday by Judge Galloway, who awarded Mrs. Wray the decree and the sum of \$2000 to cover certain claims made in the case of Mrs. Wray at the beginning of the suit. This case was handled very carefully by Attorneys Carson & Brown, for the defendant and Rauch, Senn & Seitz, for the plaintiff, and many legal problems, which arose in the matter, afforded a goodly amount of interest in the local law field.

William H. Jamison was awarded freedom from his wife, Idemia A. Jamison, on the grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment. In the complaint filed the plaintiff charges his wife with throwing a cup of hot coffee in his face through anger, and at divers times accusing him of infidelity to his marriage vows. Attorneys Rauch, Senn & Seitz were counsel for plaintiff.

Maad M. Hill, formerly of Hood River next came before Judge Galloway and told of many cruel treatments which she had been subject to at the hands of her husband, Bert P. Hill. In a complaint filed by her attorneys, Rauch, Senn & Seitz, it is alleged that Hill was continually abusing her with foul language, and at one time maltreated her by kicking and striking her. The judge thought it was advisable to grant her the decree. The defendant is at present in the East and Assistant District Attorney Charles McNary and his assistant, Walter Winslow, appeared in the case for him.

Melville Dake was granted a divorce from his wife, Anna D. Dake, on the grounds of desertion, as was Frank E. Galloway, who also alleged his wife, Edna L. Galloway, had deserted him. These two cases were similar in the complaints, both charging their better halves with leaving their homes without notice or cause, and refusing to return upon an urgent request. Attorney Carey F. Martin appeared as counsel for both of these plaintiffs.

MISSOURI HAS GONE REPUBLICAN

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 5.—Returns from Missouri today indicate that the state was carried by Taft by a small plurality, that may not be much over 100. The early estimates showing a big plurality for Bryan have been decreased constantly by the later figures, until today the result is swinging the state back into the ranks of the Republican party, where it took its place as the "mysterious stranger" four years ago.

Attorney-General Hadley, Republican, undoubtedly has been elected governor over Cowherd, Democrat. The nomination of Senator William J. Stone for re-election over Governor Joseph W. Folk is assured, and Stone's majority is now estimated at 16,000.

Five and possibly six Republican congressmen have been elected, and Stone's majority is now estimated precincts had not reported today, but it is believed that these will increase the Taft vote.

San Francisco, Nov. 5.—Francis W. Smith today swore out a warrant charging J. Pommer, the keeper of a notion store, on Stockton street, with kidnapping his 2-year-old baby girl yesterday as ransom for a broken window. Smith is incensed and declared that he will have the storekeeper jailed.

The child was in the care of Miss Louisa Kobele, a nurse, yesterday. She had wheeled the baby out for a walk and had left it in front of the store while she went inside to make a few purchases. While she was inside the child raised itself in its buggy and threw the handle through the window, breaking it.

Pommer a once seized the baby and detained the nurse, demanding \$12 ransom as the price of the broken window, before he would allow either to go.

The nurse sought a nearby store and telephoned to the baby's parents, leaving the child as hostage. The police were notified, and Pommer was arrested.

Smith went to the police station when he learned of the case, but was not allowed to see the storekeeper. He had the window repaired by a glazier, paid the cost, \$3, and took a receipt.
